High School Students Hear Talk On Nursing As Career

On Monday afternoon Mrs. J. Donald MacKay, R.N. of the Teaching Department of Prince County Hospital School of Nursing and a member of the council of the Prince Edward Island Nurses' Association and Miss Dora Andrew, second year student at Prince County Hospital Nursing School, addressed the girls of grade 11 and grade 12 at Kensington High School on the vocation of nursing.

Mrs. MacKay presented to the students the challenge which the profession of nursing offers young women and spoke of the unlimited opportunities which await every nurse, graduated from an approved school of nursing.

In her address she said that nursing gives an opportunity to serve God by serving ones fellow man. Included in the requirements to be a nurse, she said, is a keen desire to be of service to others, to possess good health, to be unselfish, trustworthy, and have at least junior matriculation in education.

Mrs. MacKay continued to say that although nursing demands the best a girl can give in study and hard work, yet it gives many hours of happiness and does allow time for recreation and fellowship. She outlined the curriculum dealing with the various arts and sciences included in the three-year course.

In conclusion Mrs. MacKay said the profession at present is not an easy one, "you are often expected to go the second mile, sometimes on aching feet, but after ten years as a graduate nurse I can truly offer it to you as the most wonderful profession offered to a woman."

Miss Andrew, spoke to the classes, telling of her own experience. As a student nurse in Prince County Hospital, she said that the advantages of training in a general hospital close to ones home and family had offset any disadvantages which she thought at first might arise.

Following Miss Andrews remarks, the students asked her many questions regarding her chosen profession.
