ISLAND AUTHOR—"The Days of Lorne, the impressions of a Governor-General," is the title of a book by Prof. W. Stewart MacNutt and recently published by the Brunswick Press, Fredericton. It covers an important part of Canadian history dealing with that period when the Marquis of Lorne was Governor General, 1878-1883. The account was largely taken from the private papers of the Duke of Argyll, Inveraray, Scotland. Mr. MacNutt is professor of History at the University of New Brunswick and is presently doing research work under a Nuffield travelling scholarship, London. He is a son of Major and Mrs. T. E. MacNutt, city.

Fraser Case Undermining Press Freedom, Is Claim

OTTAWA (CP)—Court rulings in the Blair Fraser case were described Monday by a distinguished lawyer as an undermining of freedom of the press.

John Diefenbaker (PC—Prince Albert) said in the Commons that unless the law is changed in respect to examinations for discovery there will be a drying up of information sources on which Canadian newspapers must depend.

The British Columbia courts have struck out the right of defence of Blair Fraser, Ottawa editor of Maclean's magazine, in a libel suit brought by Gordon Wismer, former B.C. attorney-general. At a pre-trial examination for discovery, Mr. Fraser refused to divulge his sources of information for a 1952 article in Maclean's entitled "B.C. Coalition Commits Suicide."

Mr. Diefenbaker spoke of the Fraser case in seeking Commons support for a bill on human rights, which he has championed for years.

He requested a bill which would assure all Canadians freedom of speech, religion, press and radio; that habeas corpus shall not be abrogated or suspended except by Parliament; that no one shall be deprived of liberty or property without due process of law and never by government order - in-council.

CHALLENGE TO PRESS
The Fraser case is a bigger challenge to the sanctity of the doctrine of freedom of the press than anything experienced in recent times.

It represented a "serious danger" and an encroachment on the rights of the press to obtain and disseminate information. He quoted from the newspaper trade magazine Editor and Publisher which described the case as an "unbelievably dangerous precedent."

Mr. Diefenbaker said the case means any newspaper can be sued for libel if it refuses to disclose its source of information.

PROTECTED IN BRITAIN
British experience had shown the necessity of maintaining freedom of the press and British newspapers were protected in cases similar to the Fraser case.

At another point, Mr. Diefenbaker quoted from a brief by the Canadian Daily Newspapers Association which favored a Canadian bill of rights.

On two previous occasions—March 20, 1952, and Dec. 7, 1953—the government had blocked such a bill by using its majority in a vote to cut off debate. In each case Mr. Diefenbaker had proposed the bill.

TORONTO (CP)—Dr. Marcus Long, philosophy professor at the University of Toronto, says teenagers are more interested in sex than in Shakespeare.

Addressing the annual dinner of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation Saturday, he said second-rate and vulgar radio and television entertainment robs young persons of time and opportunities which could enrich their lives.

UNEMPLOYMENT REPORTED HIGH IN TORONTO AREA
TORONTO (CP)—Unemployment in the Toronto area has reached its highest point since the depression, G. S. Collins, manager of the local branch of the national employment service, said Monday.

About 45,000 persons in the area—eight per cent of the total working force—are registered for employment benefits, he said. In Toronto alone, about 7,500 men, women and children are drawing relief assistance.

Mr. Collins said the 45,000 unemployed now have about 10,000 more than last year.
