

U. S. Plans Great Refugee Airlift

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—President Eisenhower's headquarters Thursday announced plans for a massive air-and-sea-lift of Hungarian refugees to the United States. James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, said that of the total of 21,500 refugees to be given asylum in the United States, the air force and the navy will provide transportation for 15,000. The remaining 6,500 will be brought here by an inter-governmental committee on European migration.

About 10,000 Hungarian refugees from Soviet oppression will come to the United States aboard government planes and about 5,000 will travel by ship, Hagerty said. "The airlift will begin within the next few days at the rate of 200 a day," a White House statement said. "The number will be progressively increased by about 100 a day until it reaches 500 a day. This should make possible the movement out of Austria of most of the refugees who are coming by air by about the end of the year or shortly thereafter."

William Holden Tops Box Office

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—William Holden has been named king of the movie money makers in a top-10 box office list dominated by veteran leading men and two shapely blondes.

For the first time, Holden won the annual poll of theatre men by the Motion Picture Herald, which was announced Thursday. The 38-year-old veteran of 17 years in films placed seventh in 1954 and fourth last year.

Following him in the 1956 poll were: John Wayne (winner in 1950-51-54), James Stewart (No. 1 last year), Burt Lancaster, Glenn Ford, Martin and Lewis tops in 1952), Gary Cooper (1953 champ, Marilyn Monroe, Kim Novak and Frank Sinatra.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

The bidding:
South West North East
1 N T Pass 2 N T Pass
Opening lead — 2 of hearts. Declarer played low from dummy. East winning with the king. What is the proper return for East to make?
The answer may be somewhat startling, but the only correct and only winning play is—East plays the club suit. If East plays the club suit, at which point West takes his king and returns a diamond. East grabbing off three diamond tricks for a one trick set. If declarer does West continues with the seven to accomplish the same result. Defense is sometimes a complicated affair and the reasons behind the aggressive queen of diamonds play are not overly simple. First of all, East notes that the dummy has 10 points, and so has he. Since declarer has from 16 to 18 points for his notrump call, West must have between 2 and 4 points, there being only 40 points in the deck. The prospect that West has hearts good enough to be built up, and also a side entry, is very dim. The heart return is therefore abandoned in favor of a diamond return. Here there is a genuine hope for successful defense. If West has the king or ace of either spades or clubs, South cannot have nine tricks. Declarer, in such a case, can take two hearts and a diamond and one of his black suits but not the other because West will intervene and return a diamond. Therefore the queen of diamonds will spike declarer's nine trick contract. If, however, as is possible, South has A-K of both black suits then West may have the king of diamonds, which is a good enough reason to lead diamonds. If declarer has all five of these key cards the battle is lost anyhow, and the queen of diamonds will do no harm, even if it does no good.

Montreal Children's Hospital Has New 13-Storey Quarters

GENEVA, MONTREAL (CP)—A dream kindled in the heart of a young doctor more than a half-century ago was realized Sunday when the Montreal Children's Hospital moved to new quarters in a 13-storey, \$10,786,000 building.
For the first time since the institution was incorporated in 1905 hospital officials expect to have plenty of room for patient treatment and rehabilitation and adequate facilities for expanding medical research.
That was the dream of the late Dr. Alexander MacKenzie Forbes, who in 1902 while a professor at McGill University banded together a public-spirited group of Montrealers with the aim of establishing a hospital "especially adapted to the needs of young people."
The new building has 401 beds, a chapel, a 173-seat amphitheatre, numerous classrooms and a gymnasium.
LOCATED IN WEST END
"Our facilities will be the best and most modern available," said Dr. Herbert Owen, assistant director of the hospital, and supervisor of the move from the present 173-bed quarters.
The 450 doctors, nurses and research workers making up the staff have few regrets about moving from the Cedar Avenue building, which have housed the hospital since 1910.
"The view from our new Tupper Street building is the west end may not be as pretty, but there is just no comparison along any other line," said Dr. Owen.
THREE-HOUR MOVE
About 100 emergency patients and 25,000 pieces of equipment are scheduled to be transferred to the new building in a operation that is expected to take three hours.
Most of the patients will be taken in buses and ambulances. Those in oxygen tents and incubators, however, will be transferred in a mobile emergency unit equipped with electric power.
Described as "one of the outstanding institutions of its kind on the North American continent," the new building is a brown brick addition to the former Western Division of the Montreal General Hospital, purchased in 1952 for \$2,500,000.
Funds for its construction were made available mainly by personal, corporation and government grants; and three Montreal joint hospital-fund campaigns.
It is ironed out.
Its paid paving contracts, including one for \$300,000 and one for \$28,000 had been let this fall and a \$1,000,000 paving job was due to begin next spring. There was "a tremendous amount of underground work," especially installation of storm sewers to be done and narrow streets to be widened.

Corner Brook Acquires All Trappings Of Civic Dignity

CORNER BROOK, Nfld. (CP)—This hillside city in western Newfoundland gets its official trappings Monday, nearly a year after it was incorporated.
With band playing and all due ceremony, the handsome new city hall will be officially opened and presentations will be made of a chain of office, charter of the college of heraldry, mace, council table, mayor's chair and chairs for the councillors.
Premier Smallwood will clip the ribbon to mark the opening of city hall, a \$154,000 job just completed by Provincial Contractors, Ltd., and will make an address after the ceremonies move inside. He will be introduced by James Hiscock, former mayor of Corner Brook West, one of four communities swallowed up by the new city last month.
Mayor Allen Bugden will speak before he is presented with a chain of office, the city's coat

of arms, charter from the college of heraldry and a mace, all a gift of Sir Eric Bowaters, president of the corporation operating the paper mill around which Corner Brook grew from an obscure logging village to a city of nearly 25,000 in the last 30 years.
PRESENT CHAIN OF OFFICE
Municipal Affairs Minister S. J. Hefferton will present a council table on behalf of the provincial government, Mayor H. G. R. Mews of St. John's will present the mayor's chair on behalf of the Newfoundland capital, and the local Chamber of Commerce will present chairs for the councillors.
The officials will attend the Chamber of Commerce annual dinner in the evening.
Mayor Bugden, whose municipal offices are "scattered all over the place" at present, said Thursday Corner Brook has moved ahead in her first year as a city, but there are "still a lot of bugs to
