Canadian Planes For Canadian Pilots, Is Plea

OTTAWA (CP) — The man chiefly responsible for the wartime development of the RCAF urged Monday night that RCAF pilots have Canadian planes to fly as long as the manned aircraft is necessary.

Senator C. G. (Chubby) Power, wartime air minister, expressed concern in a Senate speech over reports that the United States Air Force will eventually take over air defence of Canada, with the RCAF relegated to handling ground duties.

In a quiet but moving speech, the Quebec Liberal said that as long as manned aircraft are valid and necessary "let us see to it that we procure that kind of aircraft — if not in Canada, elsewhere — so that Canadian boys will be flying Canadian planes over Canadian soil for the defence of Canada."

He also urged that, in any partnership with the U.S. Air Force, that the identity of Canadian airmen serving in it be protected.

Brewery Reports Sales Increase

TORONTO (CP) — Sales of Canadian Breweries Ltd. in the first quarter of the current fiscal year are up four per cent compared with a year ago, Ian R. Dowie, president, told the company's annual meeting Monday.

The quarterly report — for the period ending Jan. 31 — will be issued April 1 and will show "a modest increase in earnings."

Mr. Dowie said the sales increase was not as great as hoped, but compared with a decline of nearly two per cent in the industry as a whole.

The industry trend, he added, reflects "the worst winter recorded in Canada in contemporary history;" the after-effects of last summer's strike of beer handlers in Ontario; and the fact that the brewing industry is competing for the consumer's dollar under two "very severe handicaps" — a "burden of taxation" and advertising restrictions.

War Disability Pensions Hike Is Being Sought

OTTAWA (CP) — A 33 1/3-per cent increase in pensions paid to Canada's war disability pensioners was proposed Monday by the Dominion Command of the War Amputations of Canada.

The association in an eight-page brief presented to the Commons veterans committee, said the boost is needed because "of the decreased value of the dollar and the increased cost of living."

The brief said "real hardship is being experienced by the war disability pensioner."

The maximum war disability pension now is \$150 a month for single veterans. The wife of a married veteran receives an additional \$50 a month and varying amounts are provided for children.

The Hong Kong Veterans Association in a second brief asked for a special federal payment to former Canadian prisoners of the Japanese to compensate them for "forced slave labor." It suggested that the amount of the payment be \$1.50 a day for each day the prisoner was in the hands of the Japanese.

13 RCN Ships Return From Bermuda Waters

HALIFAX, (CP) — Thirteen Canadian navy ships have a complement of more than 2,300 officers and men arrived here Sunday from winter exercises off Bermuda.

Heading the movement were the target facilities vessel Port St. Jean, the ocean tug St. John and the frigate Swansea.

Seven destroyer escorts docked — the Nooka, Alabaska, Algonquin, Cayuga, Iroquois, Restigouche and St. Croix.

They were followed by the frigate Fort Erie, l'Hulioise and Buckingham.

The minesweeper Fandy is due today (Monday) and three sister ships — the Thunder, Quinie and Chalour — Tuesday. The destroyer escort Haida is due Thursday and the aircraft carrier Bonaventure March 16.
