## Well Known Charlottetown Bank Manager To Retire

The retirement of John J. Morris, manager of the Charlottetown branch of the Provincial Bank of Canada is effective July 4. Mr. Morris, however, will not be taking life easier as he will be acting as a manager in various Maritime branches. He has been manager of the bank's Charlottetown branch since succeeding the late Phillip Noonan in February, 1932.

Mr. Morris was the first manager of the Provincial Bank, Summerside branch, having opened it the same day as the Charlottetown one, June 9, 1919.

His banking career began in the Royal Bank of Canada, Newcastle, in 1908 and he has seen many changes in banking practice since that time. The long columns of figures to be added up (correctly) are a thing of the past as are the old longhand letters and copy book and press. All have been replaced by progressively more mechanized and efficient methods.

There was a time when bankers worked Saturday nights, from 7 to 9 for fifty cents a night. That was in Vancouver in 1910. At that time Mr. T. W. L. Prowse, now Lieutenant Governor, and Mr. Leo Blake, Malpeque Road, were also bankers in Vancouver.

Mr. Morris has long been active in the Boy Scouts Association. He was first Scoutmaster in the first Scout troop in Summerside and has filled many positions in the movement including that of Provincial Commissioner for a number of years. He recalls with pleasure taking Lord Baden-Powell on a fishing expedition when B-P visited here. The Boy Scouts presented Mr. Morris with their Thanks Badge in recognition of his services. The Navy League of Can-

ada also presented him with a warrant of service after many years as Provincial president.

He has also been President of the Summerside and Charlottetown Boards of Trade; of the Summerside and Charlottetown Curling Clubs; treasurer of the Saint John Amulance Association. His recreations are golf and, earlier, swimming.

He is married to the former Bernadine Kenny of Summerside. One son, Bob, who was a Lieutenant-Commander in the Navy in wartime, is employed at the Charlottetown Post Office. The other, Jim, is rehabilitation officer at the Provincial Sanatorium. A daughter, Marie, Mrs. F. C. Hoskinson, who was a nurse, now lives in Montreal.

## Retiring Minister Was Once Guest Of Dalai Lama

The Rev. Roderick A. MacLeod, 71, pastor of the First Congregational Church, Haddam, Conn., and a native of Hantsville, P.E.I. for a quarter century, has announced that he will retire. He is a Ph.D. and M.A. of Yale and a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society.

Past retirement age, the former China missionary submitted the resignation, effective July 1, at the annual meeting of the church.

Parish members in the past have several times dissuaded the Rev. Mr. MacLeod from retiring. Church officials explained that they were concerned over the pastor's security. But now, one said, the pastor's new retirement home will be ready in the spring.

AUTHORITY ON TIBET The Rev. Mr. MacLeod has gained a wide reputation as an authority on the Tibetan language and customs, where he was once invited to visit the Dalai Lama.

For 10 years, he and his wife served at the Disciple of Christ Mission in Batang, Tibet. In 1927 the couple and their three children were driven from the mission during the uprisings against all foreigners. Joining a small band of brother missionaries, they escaped on horseback and foot through the narrow and dangerous passes of the Himalaya Mountains.

During the 27-day trek, before they reached safety at a small Catholic mission, the group was attacked and robbed by Chinese bandits.

After their return to this country, the MacLeods worked for two years at the White Swan Indian Mission, near Yakima, Wash., before he accepted a call to the local church in 1930.

The Rev. Mr. MacLeod was installed in 1931. Popular as a speaker on Tibet, he endeared himself to audiences with his informality, his rugged wisdom and humor. In the pulpit, his gift for reciting from memory long passages from the Bible made his scripture readings "a religious experience," as one church member expressed it.

BORN IN CANADA Born in Prince Edward Island, Canada, March 31, 1885, son of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan MacLeod, the local pastor came to this country to attend college. He was graduated from Butler University, Indianapolis, Ind., in 1914 and from Yale Divinity School in 1917. He married the former Esther Martin of Bridgeport, Ill., shortly before leaving for China.

The MacLeods have had as guests at the parsonage Dilowa Hutukhtu, High Lama of Outer Mongolia, now on the staff of John Hopkins University. Rimpoche, eldest son of the 14th Dalai Lama, has also been a guest, conversing with the local couple in his native tongue.

The pastor, whose hobby is gardening, and his wife are looking forward to retirement at their new Turkey Hill home.

"We expect that now we will be free to enter more fully than ever," the pastor said, "into the life of the community."

The couple has six grand children, John, Thomas and Elizabeth, children of Mr. and Mrs. John (Lora) Natti of Geneva, N. Y.; Keith and Robert, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Sheldon MacLeod of Rome, N. Y.; and Madeline, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan MacLeod of Chicago, Ill. Rev. Mr. MacLeod is a brother of Col. Callum MacLeod of Hantsville, P.E.I.
