



START PAVING ONE OF FINAL LINKS IN T. C. H.

Pouring of the east concrete slab on the last 1.7 miles of Trans Canada Highway between Borden and Charlottetown began this week. A portion of the slab which is seven inches in thickness can be seen in the above picture. Morrison and MacRae who have the contract for the work from the Barn corner to the City limits will carry the east slab into Pickard's Machinery before starting on the west slab. In the meantime the subgrading through the Village of Spring Park was reported by Mr. T.D. Morrison to be about 80 per cent complete. The roadway when finished will have a 22 foot concrete top with a ten foot asphalt shoulder on either side. Curbs will be added where the road runs through the populated areas. Although only a short stretch of highway, the construction of this road presented many difficulties to the contractors. Some of these were the clearing of trees, the removal of houses, the laying of storm and sewer pipes and water mains. In addition to these, power and telephone lines had to be moved by the respective companies. Mr. Morrison stated that the road would be definitely finished before the end of Autumn.

On the most recent occasion the four sub-camps, Micmac, Cree, Iroquois and Bella Coola by name, entertained visitors with songs and folk dances of many countries, and a taste of the national dishes of many lands.

At the giant campfire topping off the day, all camps contributed in an international program.

A sea ranger skipper, Mrs. Caughey said all the Guides from Charlotte County wear them.

The foreign guides have learned all about Canada's leading seacoast industries as Mrs. Caughey brought a complete lobster-fishing outfit including tiny models of weirs, traps and samples of shells and seashore animals.

A chuckwagon dinner (stew) highlighted mealtime as Iroquois sub-camp on another occasion entertained all the guides at camp. An impromptu demonstration of square-dancing was given by girls from Canada and the United States.

POPULAR EVENT This lesson enabled all the Guides to take part the following evening in a giant square dance at Sprucevale, Ont., five miles from the camp.

Professional callers were on hand to give the dance the "authentic" touch. To the delight of

all the Guides refreshments included bushels of doughnuts and gallon jugs of frosted apple cider. The press tent had a busy professional air with phones ringing and typewriters clanking. The girls were filing copy for their camp newspaper.

The editors, representing each of the sub-camps, are Gaby Laviolette of Montreal, Bev Foster of Buffalo, N.Y., Peggy Cruickshank of Minnesota and Janette Bohling of Great Britain. The paper went to press, and 36 reporters sighed with relief.

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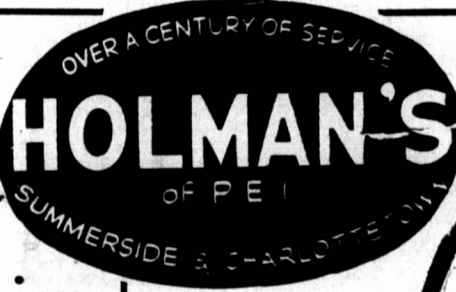
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
