HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says a series of disturbances will bring showers and scattered thundershowers to central New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island early today and tonight. Cloudy skies will prevail.

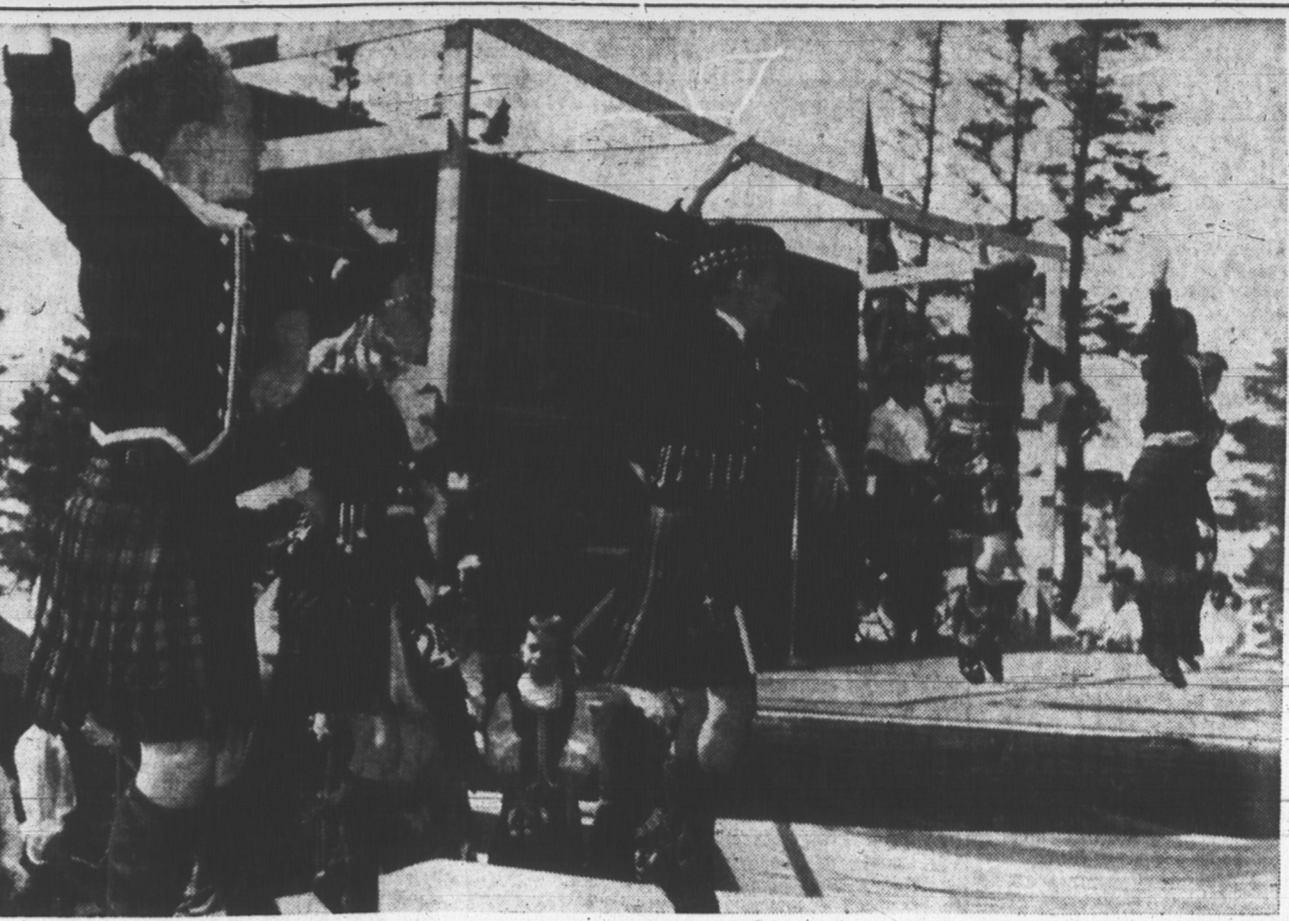
RETURNS HOME

The skill of the pipes, the swish of the kilt and the flashing feet of the dancers thrilled a crowd of over a thousand that thronged the park where Island Scottish history runs deep.

The athletic contests, highlighted by the "tossing of the caber", again demonstrated the keen interest the younger generation held in track and field events.

The 102nd annual gathering was officially opened by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell who was introduced by the president of the Caledonia Club, George MacDougall.

On behalf of the government, Premier Alex Campbell welcomed the spectators and contestants.
