## RCMP Report Being Studied On Alleged Seal Pelt Thefts

At least 3,000 pelts that were being loaded on a ship. The pelts were said to have been landed by a group of seal hunters operating with helicopters off the north coast of the province, under the direction of Dr. Marc Arsenault, Magdalen Islands. When they were seized, the pelts were being loaded on the MV Colville Bay, reported to be chartered for a trip to the Magdalen Islands.

Pelts were tested at the RCMP laboratories in Sackville to see whether or not hunters' markings on them had been changed.

Attorney General Melvin McQuaid said yesterday that he has just received a report of RCMP investigations into alleged theft of seal pelts said to have occurred off Prince Edward Island last month.
