

# UC Minister Criticizes Nfld. Labor Legislation

PRESTON, Ont. (CP) — Rev. J. R. Mutchmor said Wednesday "it would appear reasonable to expect" that Premier Smallwood of Newfoundland will call for a review of contentious labor laws passed by the Newfoundland legislature last March.

The laws, among other things, did away with two locals of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) while one of the locals was on strike against the Anglo Newfoundland Development Company at Grand Falls, Nfld.

Mr. Mutchmor, secretary of the board of evangelism and social service of the United Church of Canada, said he and the board's chairman Dr. George Birch, "were critical of the Newfoundland legislation."

"Our criticism was based upon three aspects of this new law, namely: (1) its failure to provide for a hearing of the union whose decertification was under consideration; (2) its guilt-by-association section; and (3) the lack of any section in the law under which an appeal to the courts could be made.

He said Premier Smallwood would probably refer to the labor legislation when he speaks Sunday at Centenary United Church in Hamilton.

Mr. Mutchmor's speech, released to the press in advance of delivery, was devoted to rec- changes in Canadian and United States labor legislation.

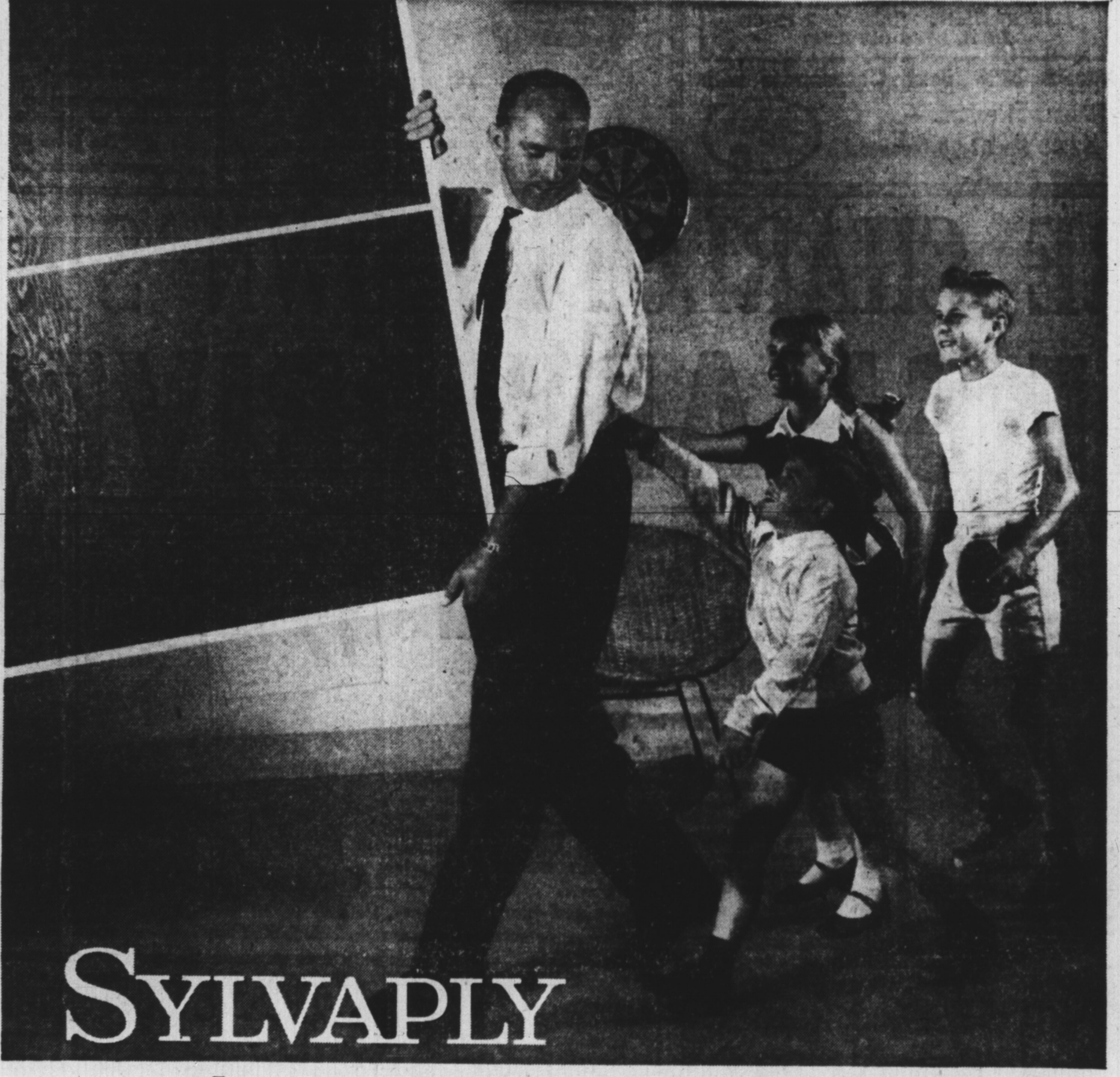


## Case Set Over To May Court
