QUEEN VICTORIA AND IRELAND.

active energy of Mr. Horace Plunkett, M.P., an Agricultural Department has been organized, and other measure have taken in the interests of those who belong to that class of the community.

DECREASE OF POPULATION.

Four years (1841) after Her Majesty came to the throne, the population of the United Kingdom was returned as follows:—

England, 16,038,000.
Scotland, 2,620,000.
Ireland, 8,107,000.

The Registrar-General's estimate of the population in the middle of the year, 1899, when the electoral rolls were made up, was:—

England and Wales, 31,742,558.
Scotland, 4,281,850.
Ireland, 4,535,516.

These figures tell their own tale. The census returns of 1891 gave the population of four of the leading cities of Ireland as follows: Dublin, 254,700, an increase from 249,500 in 1881; Belfast, 255,900, an increase from 208,100 in 1881; and it is now estimated at over 321,000; Limerick, 37,800; an increase from 300,600 in 1881, and Cork, 75,000, a decrease from 80,000 in 1881.

THE HOME RULE BILLS.

No Irish measures of the Queen's reign excited so much general interest as the Home Rule bills introduced in the sessions of 1886 and 1893 respectively. That of 1886 provided, among other things, for the creation of a Legislature, to sit in Dublin, to be composed of two houses, (1) an Upper House containing 28 representative peers and 75 members elected for two years; (2) a Lower House, consisting of the 103 members then (as now) representing Ireland in the British House of Commons, and 101 additional or a total of 204. The bill made no provision for the representation of Ireland in the House of Commons at Westminster. It provided that the Lord Lieutenant and Irish Privy Council should be independent of Great Britain; that the Irish Legislature should have power to enact laws and to impose taxes, with the exception of customs duties; that it should not interfere with the army or navy, nor in foreign or colonial affairs; that it should not endow any religious institution; that the courts and the police should be temporarily subject to the authority of the Crown.

The motion for the second reading of this bill was rejected by a vote of 313 in its favor to 343 against it, 250 Conservatives and 93 Liberals forming the majority.

At an early stage of the session of 1893, Mr. Gladstone introduced his second Home Rule Bill, materially different, in several important respects, from that rejected by the House of Commons in 1886, including a provision for having Ireland represented in London by 80 members.

After an exhaustive debate, the motion for the second reading of the bill was carried by a vote of 347 in its favor to 304 against it. On the 30th August Mr. Gladstone moved the third reading of the bill, and on the 1st September the motion was carried by a vote of 301 to 267.

On September 8th the motion for the second reading of the bill was rejected in the House of Lords, by a vote of 41 in its favor to 419 against it. In 1894 Mr. Gladstone retired from public life. He was succeeded as leader of the Government by Lord Rosebery, whose short-lived Government was defeated at the general election of 1895.

It was Mr. Gladstone's action in taking up Home Rule as a party policy which caused the defection from the Liberal ranks of many of his prominent followers, including the Duke of Argyll, the Marquis of Hartington (now Duke of Devonshire), Mr. Chamberlain, the late Mr. John Bright, Mr. Jesse Collings, Mr. Goschen, Mr. Leonard Courtney, and Mr. T. Russell.

Let us all hope that the forthcoming visit of Her Majesty to "The land where the shamrock grows" may be productive of happy and permanently beneficial results.
