United Church Film On India

"Where None May Thrust" is the title of a new feature length color film produced by the United Church and released during the meetings of General Council at the sessions held in Sackville in September.

"The picture," says a church spokesman, "is not concerned to show what we are doing in India but rather shows what God is doing in India. It is the story of an Indian, Andrew Lalil, as he relates himself to the peoples of India."

"India occupies a significant place today in world affairs. Relations between India and Canada in world councils are particularly happy. The picture presents the Indians in such a way that Canadian spectators identify themselves with the people on the screen."

"People of Canada have investments in the world from the church people in the church of India. The investment is both wise and good as the story clearly points out."

The picture is being shown on Prince Edward Island during October. Rev. Murdock Fraser of Montague, heads the committee which sponsors the film. Friday October 15th it is in Georgetown Sunday evening at the United Church Tryon and on Monday in O'Leary.

Cargo Ship Sinks In Lake Michigan

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The 258-foot Dautch cargo ship Prins Willem V sank in Lake Michigan Thursday night after colliding with a tug, but all aboard were rescued.

The Willem, an Orange line ship with 29 men aboard, went down in 80 feet of water one hour and 15 minutes after colliding with a Sinclair Oil Company tug, which was towing a barge.

The 2,000-ton ship, carrying a general cargo, was outbound from Milwaukee to Canada and Europe. The collision occurred in heavy seas, but there was no fog in the area. It was not immediately determined which vessel struck the other.

Give Verdict In Hunting Death

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP)—A coroner's jury Thursday night found that a shot fired by a "careless and negligent man" was the cause of the death of Joseph A. Hunt, 27, in a Thanksgiving Day hunting accident. The jury recommended further action by the attorney-general's department.

SPECIAL SERVICES TO MARK TRINITY CHURCH ANNIVERSARY

Each year as the anniversary of the opening of Trinity United Church draws near, the occasion is commemorated by special services. The actual date of the dedication of the present building was Sunday, the 13th day of November, 1854. Morning, afternoon and evening diets of public worship were held that day and again on the following Sunday, when eloquent addresses were delivered by visiting clergymen and inspiring music was rendered.

Outlines of the history of the Trinity pastoral charge have been published from time to time in recent years. Reference may be made to the local newspapers of November 1939 and 1944. Briefly it may be recalled that the founding of the Methodist Church in this Province followed the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Chappell in the autumn of 1774 and their removal to Charlottetown in 1778. In England, the land of his birth, Mr. Chappell had been in association with Rev. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, and had correspondence with him after coming to Charlottetown. Mr. Chappell was the moving spirit in the organization of a branch of the Wesleyan Society here. Cottage prayer meetings and other activities were conducted by the group. In 1801 Thomas Dawson, who had been a Methodist lay preacher in England, became associated with Mr. Chappell. The first Methodist minister here was the Rev. James Bulpitt some of whose descendants still reside in Prince Edward Island. From his time an un-

broken line of ministers served the local Methodist church until the great union in 1925, since when the United Church of Canada has continued to carry on this long established cause. The first church building was erected on Richmond Street just west of the present site of the Royal Bank in 1816. A second and larger church was constructed in 1835 on the site of Heartz Memorial Hall and was enlarged only two years later and again in 1846. In 1862-64 the present Trinity Church was built.

It is easy to record the foregoing facts, but the spiritual history of the generations who attended worship in these churches and meeting houses is not so easy to set down. The faith and devotion that stirred the hearts of the people, the practical good works which the church organizations performed, the vast influence multiplied in the long succession of the years which has emanated from this congregation and steadily exerted its energies in the spiritual uplift of the community, these cannot be computed. It is earnestly to be hoped that Trinity may continue long and with increasing power to render its beneficent services.

The preacher at the anniversary services next Sunday will be Rev. C. D. Matheson of Trinity Church, Summerside, one of the ablest ministers in the Maritime Conference. Special music will be prepared. There will be public worship of thanksgiving and commemoration at 11 o'clock a.m. and 7 o'clock p.m.
