HIT'S HANGING STORY.

The Lady Came to See the Fun and Did Not Want to Miss It.

Representative Pitt tells a good hanging story. It happened when his father was sheriff of an Illinois county. There had been a murder, and in due course of law the guilty man was to be hanged. Great pressure had been brought to bear to induce the governor to commute the man's sentence. That official had made up his mind to exercise executive clemency, but fore-seeing a splendid opportunity to address a large concourse of his constituents in the interest of his reelection, he concluded to speak while the preparations were going on, and at the last moment stop the execution.

An enormous crowd of spectators was gathered on the fatal day and while the poor wretch was being made ready for the drop the governor mounted a platform and began his harangue. Some one not knowing what was in the governor's mind began to circulate a petition in the crowd praying that the criminal be reprieved. Many signed it, and in passing it from hand to hand it came to a gawky country beau, who had been married that day and had brought his wife to the hanging to see the fun. He pondered deeply over the question whether to sign it or not, when the bride decided his course by breaking in:—"Don't sign that 'ar paper, Reuben. We've come at the way the hangin' is, and if you put yer name down we want see it."

Writing on Skins.

The home of vellum as a material of writing was Asia. Herodotus tells us (v. 58) that the Ionians used skins to write on because they could not get papyrus. Similarly Eunenes II, King of Pergamum, when the jealous Alexandrians would not supply papyrus for his new library, did the best he could with the vellum of his country, and so much improved it that it obtained the new name of Charter Pergamena from his capital, and thence carried down to us the appellation of "perchment." From its superior durability parchment was used, though, as it appears, sparingly, in Italy. On the contrary, besides the importation of manufactured papyrus, the latter was also made or remade at Rome as, for example, the Charta aenasiensis so named from the workshops of a certain Fannius. To judge from the remains that have reached us, in the early centuries after Christ papyrus must have been by far the chief material for writing used over all the Roman Empire except in the extreme east, till the building of Constantinople. Shortly before that event, in the celebrated library of Pamphilius, at Caesarea, in which as St. Jerome relates, the later manuscripts at least were of vellum, and a process went on for many years of copying from papyrus to vellum. Then we read of Constantine ordering from Eusebius, of Caesarea, fifty manuscripts for his new capital, containing the New Testament, for which he instructed his Governors of the neighboring provinces to supply that eminent but shifty man with the best antelope skins. Vellum manuscripts, so far as we know, continued to be few and rare to the eighth century. By that time the capture of Alexandria by the Mohammedans in 648 A. D. had produced a diminution in the supply of papyrus. Nevertheless, the latter material was used till the middle of the tenth century, when it is calculated that the manufacture of it in Egypt ceased. By this time the curative writing on vellum was in full swing. Not a few of such manuscripts have survived in the archives of Ravenna; homilies of Avitus, sermons and epistles of St. Augustin, works of Hilary, "Antiquities" of Josephus and various other writings are to be found among them. In France papyrus was in common use in the sixth century. Besides this, curative writing did not first appear in the tenth century perfect and complete, as has been popularly imagined, but dates back, we do not know how long, before the Christian era.

Clean your eyes every day when you fill it. Allow no dirt or oil to accumulate on the store. Don't cut the wick, but rub off the charred part with a rag; carefully remove thread of wick with scissors. Don't turn the flame below the dome; it runs best at medium heights. Always use the best oil and wick. To extinguish, turn it off, before blowing out the flame. See that your stove is filled each day before lighting.

What a Horse Can Draw.

THE CREOLES OF NEW ORLEANS.

Intense Conservatism is Their Distinguishing Quality.

"One of the most distinguishing qualities of the Creole is his conservatism," writes Ruth McEnery Stuart in an article on "A People Who Live Amid Romance," in the Christmas Ladies' Home Journal. "His family traditions are of obedience and respect. It begins in his church and ends in his wine-cellar. He cares not for protesting faiths or new vintages. His religion and his wines are matters of tradition. Good enough for his ancestors, are they not good enough for him and his children? His most delightful home is situated behind a heavy battened gate, sombre and forbidding in its outward expression—asking nothing of the passing world, protecting every sacredness within. The Creole lives for his family—in it. The gentle old dame, his great-aunt, perhaps, and neaine to half his children, after living her sheltered and contented life of threescore and ten years behind the great green gate that opens as a creaking event at the demand of the polished brass knocker, will tell you with a beautiful pride that she has never been on the American side of her own city above Canal street. If she will admit you as her guest to her inland garden, within her courtyard gate—and be sure she will not do so unless you present unquestionable credentials—if she will call her stately tignonned negress, Madeline, Celeste, or Zulime, who answers her in her own tongue, to fetch a chair for you into the court beside the oleander tree and the crepe-myrtle—if, seeing you seated, she bid the maid of the tignon to further serve you with orange-flower syrup or thimble glasses of liqueur or aniseite from a shining silver tray, you will, perhaps, find that the great battened door has been, indeed, a conservator of good old ways, and that its office is a worthy one, in preserving the sweet flavor of a picturesque hospitality whose Old World fragrance is still unspiced by innovations, and unstained by emulation or contact."

Former Slave Market, Constantino.

On benches so placed as to command a good view were buyers, coarse-looking Turks, whose calm, searching gaze seemed to take in every detail. The merchant conducting the sale stood before them, tall and gesticulating with great vehemence. He turned to one of the pens, which was filled with young Circassian women, most of whom were very handsome. They were seated close together on the ground in an attitude of listless despondency, their white garments flowing around them, and as they gazed up at me with their sad, dark eyes, I felt painfully how they must envy the free and happy stranger who came to look on them in their infamy and misery.

The slave trade came forward, followed by a phlegmatic-looking Turk, and, seizing one of the women by the arm, forced her to stand up before this man, who it appeared, wished to buy her. He proceeded to inspect her, very much in the same manner as he might have examined a horse or a dog, and his decision was unfavorable; he turned away with a contemptuous movement of the head, and the slave-merchant, in a rage, thrust back the unfortunate girl, who sank down trembling among her companions in captivity. This scene was as much as we could stand, and we left the place hurriedly at once; it is well indeed that such sights can be witnessed no more, at least in Europe.

Flexible Glass.

Scarcely a month passes without our being informed of some new application of glass in art or commerce, but there is one form of glass which is unknown to most people, namely, soft glass or glass paste. Yet it is hundreds of years old.

The old Roman glass makers carried to the grave their secret method of preparing a glass paste which they modeled cold, just as we model clay. This malleable glass, upon which you could get the impression of your finger exactly as on glass, gave off a most pleasant perfume.

Another variety made by the Romans had qualities similar to rubber; if it were thrown down forcibly it rebounded; if struck with a hammer it yielded and immediately resumed its original shape. It is related that the Emperor Trajan ordered a workman's head to be cut off so that he should not reveal the secret, the reason given for this act being that if the method of preparation became known people would think no more of gold than of dirt.

The secret of the manufacture of glass paste died with the Roman artisans and has never been discovered. Now we hear that an eminent sculptor, who has a well-equipped laboratory, has succeeded in producing a glass paste similar to that described in ancient writings. You can drive nails into it as you can into lead.
