Tourists Come From Many Places, Varied Occupations

Where do our tourists come from? Are their occupations interestingly different from ours? Have they been here before and are they enjoying their visit sufficiently to return again?

A Guardian representative recently made a brief visit to Harbor View Cabins in Summerside for the answers to these questions. Meeting people at random as they played or relaxed on the shore or in the water, he met both Canadian and American visitors from a fascinating variety of occupations.

A few had been born on the Island and were revisiting their native province, many were regular summer visitors, and many others were pleased and delighted in their first visit to Canada's garden province. All were particularly pleased with the scenery, beaches, climate and friendliness of the Island people. Two regular visitors who have spent about a dozen very enjoyable summers holidaying on Prince Edward Island are Dr. and Mrs. C. W. Van Der Merwe of Forest Hills, New York.

Dr. Van Der Merwe is Professor of Physics at New York University and Chairman of the Physics Department for the University. Dr. and Mrs. Van Der Merwe are both originally from South Africa and came to the United States in 1924 after the Doctor had completed studies in physics. He said that when he was a youngster, a professor of physics was supposed to know all there was to know about physics; nowadays, because it has become such a tremendous field, the best one can now do is be a professor of a small section of physics.

Dr. Van Der Merwe, who was recently on a television programme on which "flying saucers" were discussed, said, "I may as well admit I know nothing at all about flying saucers," and he added, "I do not believe they are visitors from interstellar space."

Dr. Van Der Merwe has participated in many research projects in physics and is currently engaged in research in cosmic rays, micro waves, and the so called solid state of matter.

In 1949 he was a member of a committee of physicists who were engaged by the mayor of New York in the first experiments of producing rain by sprinkling clouds with solid carbon dioxide, commonly called "dry ice."

He humorously recalled that he was the only one in the group who apparently had faith in the success of the operation—he was the only one who came prepared with umbrella, rain coat and rubber boots.

He said that when he arrives on Prince Edward Island each year after the hustle and bustle of New York, he has one overwhelming impulse and that is to sleep, eat, rest, and swim.

Bad Weather Delays Search For Missing Plane

Weather conditions which in some areas closed to a ceiling of less than 500 feet, yesterday forced cancellation of the search by planes from R. C. A. F. station, Summerside, for a Harvard aircraft with two men aboard, missing since Monday afternoon.

The entire Island and surrounding coastal waters, termed as "probable areas" by the Airforce, have been thoroughly searched without finding a trace of the light, yellow, single engine plane which disappeared on "local flying" over the Island while practicing aerobatics and simulated forced landing exercises.

Yesterday's search was to have included sections of New Brunswick, Gaspé, Northumberland Strait, and the Gulf of St. Lawrence which as yet have not been searched, and which were termed "possible areas" over which the plane could have flown on the gas supply it was known to have carried.

The only two occupants of the plane were identified on Tuesday as P. O. Donald G. Laxson, of Asbestos, Quebec, the pilot; and P. O. Joseph B. C. Labonte, of Point Rouge Quebec.

Yesterday, despite poor visibility, crews, accompanied by newsmen from two local papers, had been briefed by searchmaster, Squadron Leader J. M. Wicken, and were aboard their respective aircraft with all motors warmed up for the take-off when worsening weather conditions over the search area forced the cancellation of the search and the return of two planes that were already in the air.

Weather conditions permitting, planes will take off this morning to continue the search.

S-L Wicken said yesterday that the Airforce is grateful for all possible clues it has received from the civilian population in the Maritimes, which came as the result of an appeal from the Airforce for information which might be helpful in the search.

Information of this kind has very often led to the discovery of a missing plane.

With the exception of two which were received yesterday, all of these "possible clues" have been thoroughly investigated. - S.
