TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

THE TUNNEL QUESTION

Senator Howlan in London. Sir Douglas Fox Promises a Report in Less Than Ten Days.

LONDON, April 21. A full discussion on the tunnel question has taken place in the past few days. There were present Sir Douglas Fox and Francis Fox, Sir Charles Metcalf, Mr. Pearson, the contractor of the Hudson River tunnel; Mr. Squiers, the engineer of the Severn Tunnel; and Mr. Palmer, of the Queensland Railway, with Hon. Senator Howlan. Sir Douglas Fox promises to report inside of ten days.

More Trouble With Portugal. An Insult to be Resented.

LONDON, April 21. Details of the firing of the British steamer Agnes by the Portuguese authorities on the Pango River, show a determined effort to drive British subjects from that territory. A serious rupture is impending, as England will promptly resent the insult to her flag.

Why Davitt Was Left Out. LONDON, April 21. In the British House of Commons, Smith, leader of the Government, said yesterday that Davitt's name had been omitted from the list of royal labor commissioners because of Davitt's evidence before the special Parnell Commission, coupled with the fact that he had been convicted of treason felony.

The Passengers Complaint. ST. JOHN, April 21. Previous complaints are made as to the treatment of passengers on the Halifax-West India Line. It is now said that the Taymouth Castle, of the Furness Line, will take the Loanda's place, the latter being unfitted for the service. The matter will likely be brought up in Parliament this session.

Reign of Terror. LONDON, April 21. The mails from Madagascar announce that the Sakalavas of Mairamboos massacred the Governor of Tubear and fifty-seven Hura soldiers. Thirteen customs officials were also murdered. The inhabitants have fled in terror to the neighboring French Colony.

Another Social Scandal. LONDON, April. A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Decobain, M. P., for Belfast, charged with bestial crime. Replying to Healy, Col. Sanderson, said in the Commons last night that Decobain was not Grand Master of an Orange Lodge or an Orangeman.

Alarm in Ireland. DUBLIN, April 21. Considerable alarm prevails among small farmers and the poor people of the Skibbereen district, because the seed potatoes distributed as a result of the relief measures of the government and planted weeks ago, have not yet shown signs of life.

Schrieber's Movements. ST. JOHN, April 21. Mr. Schrieber, Superintendent of Government Railways, was in St. John on Monday, on an official visit, and left for Ottawa last night.

Successful Canadian. OTTAWA, April 21. Mr. Ogilvie, of the Interior Department, Ottawa, has been awarded the annual prize of \$150, given by the Royal Geographical Society for best year's work in discovery—open to all the world.

The Pasteur Treatment. VIENNA, April 21. Thirty-two persons were recently bitten by a mad wolf in an Austrian village. All who are in a condition to stand the journey will be sent to Paris for treatment by Pasteur.
