TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Mystery Solved. ST. JOHN, N. B., May 5. At last the mystery of the Roman Catholic burying ground, outside of Carleton, has been explained away. The body was that of Thomas Boyle, who died nearly three years ago. The man who crossed over from Carleton on Sunday morning, a description of whom appeared in yesterday's S. M., was Thos. Randall, of Sussex, and was at one time in the Provincial lunatic asylum, and escaped from that institution. He has for six years been determined to gain possession of the body of his cousin, John Buckley, who died in 1881. Randall says he went to the burying ground Saturday night for the purpose of obtaining the body of Buckley. He saw the grave which had been opened and supposing that Buckley was buried there removed the body from the coffin; but finding that there was little or no flesh on it concluded that it would be of no use to him. He threw the body down and left the cemetery.

The Curley Case. OTTAWA, May 4. Justice Henry this morning delivered judgment in the application for a habeas corpus in the matter of Philip Curley, imprisoned in Charlottetown under conviction for a third offence under the Canada Temperance Act. He was not present at his conviction, and was not arrested until subsequent to the expiry of two months, and the counsel held that he should not then have been arrested, as his sentence ran from the date of conviction. His Lordship held that the section of the criminal procedure act, making the sentence run from the passing of it, did not apply to cases under the Canada Temperance Act, and refused to discharge the prisoner.

A Terrible Explosion. VICTORIA, B. C., May 4. A special from Nanaimo, eastern shore of Vancouver Island, says a terrible explosion occurred in the Victoria Coal Company's mine last night. One hundred and fifty men are believed to be in the mine. At midnight several bodies were recovered. A rescuing party went down, but owing to the black damp were unable to do anything. One of the party died shortly after coming out. The scene around the shaft is most heartrending.

Earthquake and Volcano. TUCSON, Arizona, May 4. An earthquake occurred here at 2.12 yesterday. No persons were injured. Considerable damage was done to buildings. The entire population took to the streets terror-stricken. The court house cupola swayed like a ship in a turbulent sea. This is the first earthquake ever experienced in Tucson. Shortly after the earthquake a volcano broke out. The sky is brilliantly illuminated.

A Heavy Case. MONTREAL, May 4. Judge Loranger to-day gave judgment in the \$500,000 action of R. A. & J. Stewart, of St. John, N. B., against the Bank of B. N. A. The present action was instituted on the grounds that the bank refused to honor two cheques which were presented to them by the plaintiffs while they had funds in the bank.

Singular Phenomena. BENSON, Arizona, May 4. A person just in from the vicinity of San Pedro River reports that the ground opened about six inches. The water rose in places hitherto perfectly dry. Ten miles from the city a lake, covering an acre of ground, dried up in twenty minutes.

A Canard. HALIFAX, May 4. The story of the alleged loss of an ocean steamer on Sable Island with a large loss of life, published in this morning's Chronicle and sent out as an unassociated press-despatch, turns out to be a canard.

Fatal Accident. SACKVILLE, N. B., May 5. The express from Quebec struck a snow-slide near Trois Pistoles last night, killing the fireman. The brakeman is also reported seriously injured.

A Counter Demonstration. MONTREAL, May 4. A counter-demonstration on the evening of Mr. O'Brien's proposed attack upon Lord Lansdowne, in this city, is talked of.

Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, May 5—10 a.m. Moderate winds, fair and warm.

A MOVEMENT is on foot in Souris to have the Boston steamers call there once a week. A letter has been forwarded to the owners of the line asking them to allow their steamers to call, and promising a large amount of freight during the summer in fish and farm produce. Owing to the American inter-state law that has recently come into force, the carrying-trade from the Maritime Provinces to the United States is likely to be done chiefly by water and not by rail as heretofore. We trust that the Souris people may succeed in securing the services of the Boston steamers.
