## Nominations Today In 21 Scattered Constituencies

There is a chance of two acclamations today in official nominations in 21 scattered constituencies for the June 10 Dominion election.  
In Burin - Burgeo and Grand Falls-White Bay-Labrador in Newfoundland only Liberals had candidates announced by Saturday. However, candidates have until 2 p.m. local standard time today to file nomination papers and pay their \$200 deposits to qualify for the election.  
The 21 constituencies comprise five in Newfoundland, two in Quebec, three in Ontario, one in Manitoba, three in Saskatchewan, three in Alberta, two in British Columbia, the single Yukon seat and Mackenzie River in the Northwest Territories. Their nominations are earlier to permit time to deliver ballots and other election supplies.  
Nominations in the other 242 constituencies, two of which return two members, close Monday, May 27, two weeks before the election.  
According to a compilation by The Canadian Press, 60 candidates have been nominated at party conventions in the 21 constituencies.

The Liberals are contesting all 21 Progressive Conservative have 19 candidates, CCF 12 and Social Credit eight.  
**INCLUDE TWO LEADERS**  
Two party leaders are among today's field - John G. Diefenbaker, Progressive Conservative, in Prince Albert and Solon Low, Social Credit, in Peace River.  
The roster also includes two cabinet ministers and a parliamentary assistant: Immigration Minister Pickersgill in Bonavista-Twillingate, Trade Minister Howe in Port Arthur and William Ben-dickson, parliamentary assistant to Finance Minister Harris, in Kenora-Rainy River.  
In Burin-Burgeo the only nominee is C. W. Carter and in Grand Falls-White Bay-Labrador it is T. G. W. Ashbourne. Both were Liberal members of the last House. There were two acclamations in the 1953 election, both to Liberals.  
Mr. Pickersgill faces a Progressive Conservative opponent, John Pilsent, in his riding. Mr. Howe has two opponents, D. M. Fisher, CCF, and Miss Ina Vignars, Progressive Conservative. Mr. Ben-

dickson is against Mrs. Jo Carter, CCF, and William J. Gray, Progressive Conservative.

## May Establish Stratford As World Film Showplace

**TORONTO (CP)**—The Canadian Stratford Shakespearean Festival seemed an imaginative scheme when first proposed, and many observers said it wouldn't last, but it continues to grow even beyond the scope of the original idea.  
Last year Stratford played host to great classical and jazz musicians of the North American continent. This year a film festival will be included which may put the city on a footing with other world film festival cities, such as Edinburgh, Cannes and Venice.  
A program of top cinematic productions from all over the world will be presented in conjunction with the festival was announced at a press conference here.

### TWO-WEEK PROGRAM

The films are to be shown at the Vogue movie theatre in Stratford July 8-20. The programs will change daily, with the major films repeated during the second week.

For all but one film, the festival showing will be a Canadian premiere and several will receive their North American or World premieres. Films from both sides of the iron curtain are to be included, with foreign language films with English subtitles.  
John Hayes, production manager, said the foundation expects to gain recognition from the International Producers Association on the basis of this year's show.

This would establish Stratford as a world film showplace, and the only film festival city in North America.

This year's festival includes notable films among them The Naked Eye and Girl and the Oak.

## University Head Says N.S. Starves Higher Education

**WOLFVILLE, N.S. (CP)**—President Watson Kirkconnell of Acadia University has charged the Nova Scotia government with failure "to make any just provisions for higher education."  
Writing in the current Acadia Bulletin, college alumni organ, he says thousands of students will be denied a college education unless the province gives financial aid.

He says too many Nova Scotians used complaints about the size of federal grants to colleges as "a red herring" to draw attention away from lack of provincial support.  
The province had made phenomenal progress in elementary and secondary schools in the last 20 years. Teachers at last were adequately paid. But prospects for the future of college education became steadily darker.  
"In less than 10 years, when existing registrations will be doubled, the province will have to come to the rescue with large capital and maintenance grants or see thousands of Nova Scotia students simply refused a higher education."

**OTHER PROVINCES HELP**  
Every other province in Canada made substantial grants to its universities, even private and denominational ones. Nova Scotia alone did not.

"Only Nova Scotia still hesitates to help its own provincial universities, whose graduates more than any other group in our communal life have brought fame to their native province and rendered service to their native land."  
Only two of the province's nine universities and colleges are government-supported. They are the Nova Scotia Technical College and the Nova Scotia Agricultural Col-

lege.  
The other seven—King's, Dalhousie, Acadia, St. Francis Xavier, St. Mary's, Mount St. Vincent and St. Anne—are private institutions.

Dr. Kirkconnell says but for the private colleges the province would have had to spend at least \$50,000,000 for buildings and staff. The province would have to do it today if the colleges closed.

**\$1,000 A STUDENT**  
He says the government pays more than \$1,000 a student at Nova Scotia Tech in the last two years of a five-year engineering course. For students in private universities in the first three years of the same course, the province paid nothing.

"The government is hitch-hiking at the expense of the poor universities," whose budgets were balanced "by starving the professors."

In Dr. Kirkconnell's view grants to colleges are "not munificent beyond a degree of legislative duty." In provincial support "Nova Scotia litters at the tail of the Canadian procession."

## N.Y. Stock Market Touches New High For Current Year

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The stock market cracked through to a new 1957 high last week in brisk trading.  
Climaxing an unbroken string of 11 weekly advances, most of them small, the market finally rose beyond its high of early January.  
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose 30 cents to \$123.50.  
The news background of the stock market was decidedly mixed last week. Steel industry operations dropped to the lowest level since the period immediately following last summer's steel strike. Bethlehem Steel shut down three more open hearth furnaces at its Lackawanna, N.Y. plant. Price-cutting was reported for copper, lead and zinc. Rail carloadings continued below year-ago levels.  
The five most active issues on the American Stock Exchange were:  
Silver Creek Precision, off 1-16 at 1/4 on 140,000 shares; C. and C. Super Corp., unchanged at 1/4; Cornucopia Gold Mines, off 1-16 at 11-16; Barium Steel, up 1/4 at 9/16; and Norbit Corp., up 1/4 at 3/4.  
Among Canadian issues on the American exchange, Canadian Pacific climbed to 36 1/4 from 35 1/2. Distillers - Seagram moved up a point to 35, and Walker-Gooderham moved up 1/4 to 7 1/2. Hudson Bay Mining dropped 6 points to 71. American International Nickel dropped to 109 1/4 from 112 1/2.

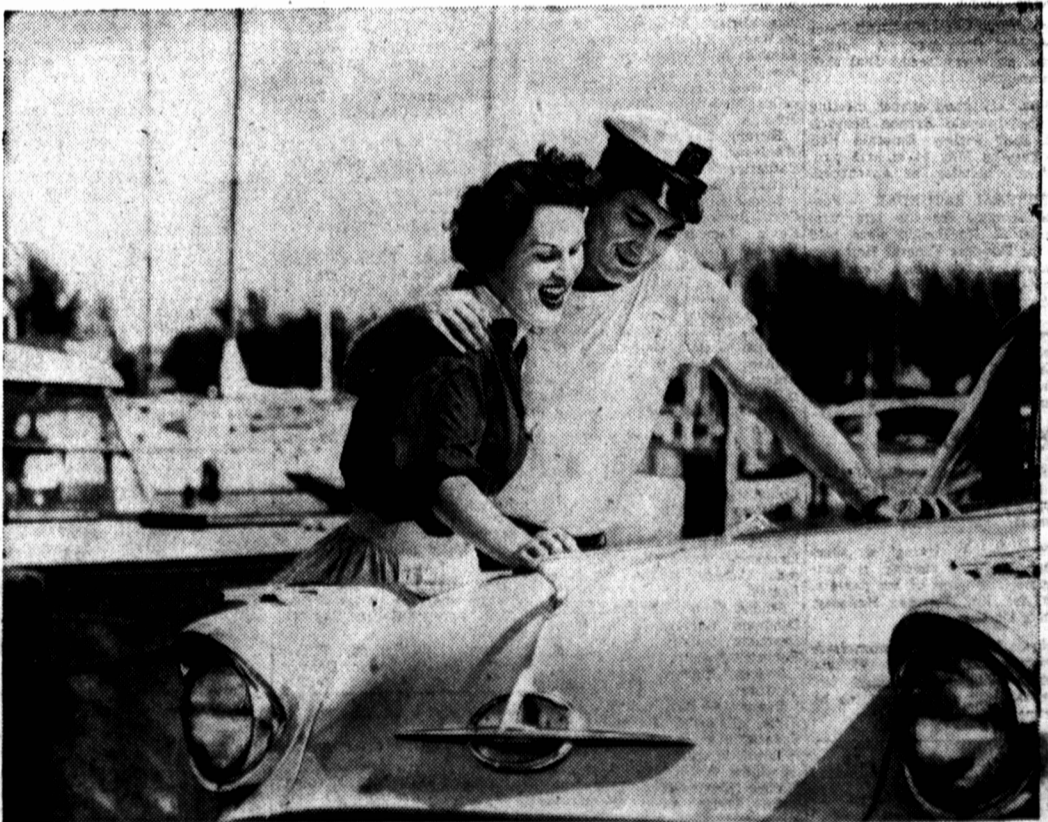
