Georgetown Baby Fine After Special Operation

TORONTO (CP)—A Toronto heart surgeon described as "grand" the condition Monday night of nine-month-old Lisa Parker of Prince Edward Island and said his decision has been made about surgery.

Lisa was flown here Thursday from Georgetown on an RCAF mercy flight after her heart dropped to 40 beats a minute following failure of an electronic heart "pacemaker" she had worn since shortly after birth.

A cardiac catheterization was performed on Lisa Friday to take the place of the faulty pacemaker.

The catheterization involves inserting a thin tube up a heart vein and attaching it to an outside power source which delivers electrical impulses to the heart muscles and speeds up the heart beat.

Dr. George Trusler said a group of heart specialists is evaluating the condition of the heart through an oscilloscope attached to the stimulating apparatus.

He said the catheterization is a temporary device and that a new pacemaker may be necessary.

The pacemaker differs from catheterization in that the wire is attached to the outside of the heart rather than through a vein to the inside of the heart. The pacemaker, usually battery-powered, is worn outside the chest.

Dr. Trusler said it is not known whether Lisa will have to wear the pacemaker for the rest of her life or if her heart muscles will become stronger as she grows older.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says the storm that gave snow, freezing rain and rain to the Maritimes Monday was crossing the southeastern tip of New Brunswick on its way to the Gulf of St. Lawrence late Monday evening. It had given about six inches of snow to northern and central New Brunswick while Prince Edward Island and southern New Brunswick received a mixture of snow and freezing rain. Nova Scotia was presented with rain as well.

The storm will move rapidly off to the east today, leaving a strong northwesterly flow of arctic air over the Maritimes. This will result in variable amounts of cloud and sunshine. A few snowflurries are likely particularly in those regions exposed to northerly winds off the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Mostly sunny weather is predicted for Wednesday.
