The Scots were always proud and independent, the speaker continued. They had never had a peasant class as was found in so many other countries. Scots were ideal immigrants for when they adopted a country, they became part of it. He reviewed the Selkirk and other settlements, and said the intertwining of the Scot's love of education and his abiding faith in religion made these settlements successful although faced with great hardships. "I give you Scotland," he concluded. "I give you only a geographical location, but to all of Scottish ancestry a kingdom of the mind and of the heart with sovereignty in Almighty God."

Blood Donor Clinics Today At RCAF Station And No. Rustico

The mobile blood donor team from the Maritime Depot of the Canadian Red Cross Blood Transfusion at Halifax, headed by Miss Browne, R.N., arrived safely in Summerside last evening in spite of slippery road conditions. Early this morning the P.M.E. team will start the four days of P.M.E. clinics at the R.C.A.F. Station where F.L.J. Warren, chairman of the blood donor committee, reports 210 have signed their intentions of being blood donors. The team will move to North Rustico in the afternoon to conduct a clinic there in the evening at "Stella Maris Hall" where the objective is at least 150 donors from North Rustico and the surrounding districts. The enthusiasm and interest being displayed on all sides augurs well for the success of this year's series of blood donor clinics which are the last for 1956 and must produce 1,500 donors to keep the Blood Bank well stocked for the winter months.
