Hill Cloud is getting good. He has cut his mark to 2:07 1/2.

The record for 4-year-old trotting geldings is now 2:10 1/2, and is held by The Monk.

L. V. Harkness owns Queen Ethel, dam of Bumps, and is breeding her to Allie Wilkes, 2:15.

Miss Della Fox, 2:14 1/2, is laid up waiting for the Kentucky Futurity, which will be her next start.

Praytell made his first start of the season at Decatur and lowered his own and the track record to 2:10 1/2.

Guinette, Roan Wilkes, Pearl Onward, Helat-law and Badge met recently in the 2:07 Press purse at Harford.

Why can't some 8-year old pacer beat 2:09 1/2? With five now tied for the championship at that notch the situation is waxing tiresome.

The engagement of John R. Gentry and Robert J. at Pittsfield, Mass., for Sept. 16 has been canceled, and they will appear at Lowell instead on that date.

As the sire of Baron Rogers, 2:09 1/2, and Oakland Baron, 2:09 1/2, Baron Wilkes is the only stallion who has sired two stallions with trotting race records of 2:10 or better.

A correspondent writes from Green Valley, Ia., that he recently saw the pacing stallion Medoone, 2:13 1/2, by Aleyone, work a third mile on a half mile track in 2:13, last half in 1:02 1/2.

A Permanent Paste.

Soak an ounce of refined gelatin in cold water for an hour, then drain off and squeeze out the water as much as possible. Put the gelatin in a jelly pot and place the pot in a pan of hot water over the fire. When the gelatin has melted, stir in slowly 2 1/2 ounces of pure alcohol. Put in a wide mouthed bottle and cork tightly. This glue or paste will keep indefinitely and can be melted for use in a few minutes by setting the bottle in a basin of hot water. As it contains a very small percentage of water it affects the gloss of the prints but little and dries almost immediately.—Harper's Round Table.

English Sunday Laws.

English judges are showing a disinclination to enforce the Sunday laws on the statute book. A person named Williams brought suit against The Times for advertising a Sunday concert, contrary to the act of 1781. In court he declined to take oath on the ground that he had no religious belief and stated that he objected to the law himself. The judge squirmed out of the difficulty by ruling that the statute had not been violated, inasmuch as "admission" to the concert was free, although the seats had to be paid for.
