Trainor continued to drive the boys in workouts throughout yesterday and had three new faces in the persons of Frank Darrington, Frank Roper and "Bonnie" Howatt.

Frank "Danky" Darrington, who last year played centre on the great Junior line of Dalling-Darrington, Billicks, really was impressive in yesterday's workouts. He was centering a line made up of Orin Carver on right wing and Lorne Hennessey on left wing. This trio looked to be about the best on the ice.

Other forward lines that showed up well yesterday were the lines of Whitlock, Gray and Dowling, and the Schurman, Trainor, Dunn line.

The defence led by big Gus Gustavson is looking better with each practice and should be ready to go by Monday night. The rest of the defence includes Larry

Blackburn, Stu' MacLure, Bill Tysko, Roland Pilon, Ron McArthur and Junior McLeod. McArthur, who played with Saint Mary's Juniors last year, looked very good in yesterday's session.

New Players Expected

Coach Trainor announced after the workout that Paul Sandon, who is a former Valleyfield Braves player and who played games for the Islanders in 1952, would arrive in the City Saturday. He is a big left winger and will line up with the Islanders for the coming season.

Toronto Maple Leafs In 4-1 Victory Over Bruins

BOSTON. (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs handed Boston Bruins their first defeat of the National Hockey League season Thursday night, defeating them 4-1 before 7,619 fans. It was only the second Leaf victory on Boston ice in the last two years.

The Leafs slammed home three goals in the first period to wrap up their victory. Boston cut the margin in the second frame but Toronto scored the clincher in the third.

Veteran Harry Watson and youthful Eric Nesterenko, who graduated from junior ranks last spring, paced the Leafs at attack with a goal and an assist piece. Ron Stewart and Rudy Migay fired their remaining tallies.

Johnny Pearson fired the lone Boston goal, his third in the two games the Bruins have played.

The victory boosted Toronto into a second-place tie with Detroit Red Wings, two points behind Montreal Canadiens, who defeated New York Rangers 6-1 Thursday night. The Bruins dropped into a fourth-place tie with the Rangers.

Yvon Durelle Retains Title

MONCTON. (CP)—Yvon Durelle, Baie Ste. Anne, N. B., retained his Canadian light-heavyweight boxing title Thursday night with a 12-round decision over Gordon Wallace, Byantford, Ont. Durelle weighed 166 and Wallace 167.

It was the champion's second win over the Bramford, batter, who lost at Glace Bay, N.S., last July.

In the semi-final, Til LeBlanc, 131, Moncton, pounded out an unanimous decision over Clarence Doucet of Westville, N. S., in six rounds. Doucet was down twice for nine counts.

Durelle piled up a lead in the early rounds. His best effort was in the tenth round when the pair stood toe to toe and slugged it out.

Durelle had an edge in the slugging and opened a cut over Wallace's left eye which bled intermittently during the remaining 10 rounds.

Wallace won strong vocal support in the late rounds as he was punched with an authoritative left hook to Durelle's mid-section.

Two judges scored it five rounds for Durelle and three for Wallace. The other gave the champ five rounds to four with three even.

CHICOUTIMI, Que. (CP)—Chicoutimi Saguenens built up an early four-goal lead and then staved off a third-period drive by Sherbrooke Thursday night to down the Saints 4-2 in a Quebec Hockey League game here.

Beliveau Scores Pair As Canadiens Score 6-1 Win Over New York Rangers

MONTREAL. (CP)—Jean Beliveau, Montreal Canadiens' high-priced star rookie, scored two goals, his first of the young National Hockey League season, Thursday night as the Canadiens defeated New York Rangers 6-1.

Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion, another Montreal youngster, also scored twice as the Canadiens all but ran wild over the New Yorkers.

The Rangers, with a fresh crop of youngsters this season, gave signs of making it a real tussle at the start but faded quickly under persistent Montreal pressure.

Maurice Richard and Eddie Mazur finished off the Canadiens' scoring. Wally Hergesheimer, the Rangers' leading scorer last season scored their goal.

It was the same story for the New Yorkers. Not since Feb. 18, 1950, have the Rangers won a game at Montreal in the regular schedule of the National Hockey League. They won later the same season in the playoffs.

Geoffrion was the most bothersome sniper goalie Johnny Bowler had to contend with and just missed scoring on several occasions.

Beliveau's outburst brought his first goal of the season, and he teamed up better with Richard than in any of the three previous games.

The veteran Elmer Lach figured

in three goals and the three assists sent his all-time point total in the NHL to 602.

The win put Montreal in first place in the league standing two points ahead of the idle Detroit Red Wings and Toronto Leafs, who defeated Boston 4-1.

BROOKLYN. (AP)—Charlie Dressen will get another chance today to accept a one-year contract to manage the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Dressen, who on Wednesday spurned such a contract, said he had talked the matter over with his wife and was ready to resume the discussions with club president Walter O'Malley. He declined to say whether he had weakened in his demand for a two-year contract.

The Dodger office said it had received an indication from Dressen that he would accept a one-year contract would be acceptable. The office did say that O'Malley and Dressen would meet today. The two attended Thursday's racing program at Jamaica, keeping an appointment made some time ago.

"All I can tell you is I'm going to see O'Malley again tomorrow," the depressed little pilot said. "I honestly don't know what will happen."

Cables From Friends
Even as Dressen was contemplating his next move, friends and well-wishers were telephoning him constantly and sending telegrams. Other major league managers, nearly to a man, expressed their surprise and puzzlement at the strange situation.

"A friend of mine called me and told me I was under consideration in Baltimore," Dressen said. "I don't know whether it's the general manager's job or the manager's. But I guess they can't do anything right away."

ALBANY, Calif. (AP)—Jockey Willie Shoemaker tied the United States record of 390 victories in a season Thursday when he brought home Halkette in the feature race at Golden Gate Fields.

It was Shoemaker's first victory in 13 races Wednesday and Thursday. The record was set last year by Tony DeSpritto.

Shoemaker, 22, born in El Paso, Tex., failed to win on six mounts Wednesday and could do no better than second on the first six races Thursday. But he left nothing to be desired in the feature.

Harris now is field manager of Washington Senators and Dressen is talking about returning as field manager of Brooklyn Dodgers for only a one year contract.

"That statement about Harris is not true," Clyde Morris, secretary-treasurer.

"No decision has been made with respect to a general manager and no one may be said to have the inside track. We have not talked to Mr. Harris or Mr. Dressen."

Both Hildebrand and Birukow played under Chamberlain when he coached the Millionaires in 1950-51.

Recommends Auto Plants Limit Output

TORONTO, Ont. (CP)—Paul G. Hoffman, Studebaker Corp. board chairman recommended here Thursday that auto factories limit output to that volume of cars that can be sold at a profit through hard, intelligent selling.

Speaking before representatives of the Federation of Automobile Dealer Associations, Hoffman criticized what he termed the "razzle dazzle" of current automobile merchandising.

He told of one group of dealers who advertise offers to sell new cars at one dollar above cost. Another dealer, he said, "is offering \$700 discount on his higher priced line. Of course, he has a 'pack' of \$300 so he can make a few dimes. But such advertising doesn't help the market."

Hoffman scoffed at talk of "saturation" in the auto industry, saying he heard talk about it ever since 1909.

Studebaker Corp. cut back its factory output about one-third recently explaining: "We want to decrease the number of cars in dealers' hands."

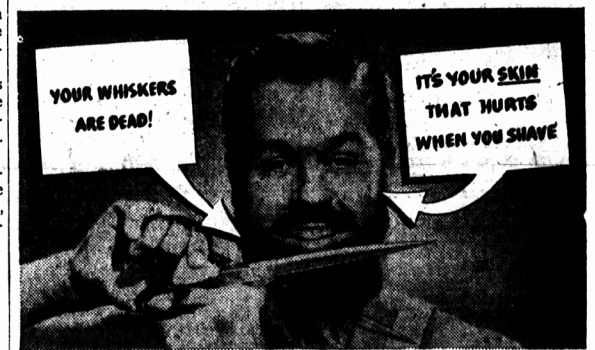
