### Two Summerside Men Fined After Theatre Lobby Brawl

SUMMERSIDE — Two young Summerside men, Louis Gallant and Edouard Ferrish pleaded guilty in police court yesterday to charges of causing a disturbance in a public place by fighting and swearing. Each was fined \$15 and costs or one month by Magistrate R.S. Hinton, QC.

The incident took place Friday evening in the lobby of the Capitol Theatre.

Chief of Police Peter White told the court RCMP Constable James Potts was in the theatre at the time of the incident and reported the scuffle to town police. He said that Gallant and several other young men left their seats and shortly after, he heard a noise in the lobby. He went out and found Gallant and Ferrish on the floor fighting. He stated he separated them and reported the disturbance to the town police office.

When asked by the magistrate the cause for the disturbance neither man would give an explanation for their actions.

The chief said "it was a poor place to settle a dispute. They should have found a more convenient spot."

### Ensington Imposing Tax on Dogs At Large

KENSINGTON — The Kensington Town Council reported at its regular meeting last night that many complaints have been received about dogs running at large and causing annoyance.

As a result the council passed a motion that a \$5 licence fee be charged on all dogs whose owners wished them to run at large. No fee is to be charged on dogs kept on their owner's property or on a leash.

All dogs found running at large or causing annoyance while on their owner's property will be dealt with in accordance with the town's bylaws. It was stated. The bylaws provide for the disposal of such dogs, following notice to the owner.

The council also approved the application by William L. Delaney for a permit to build a residence on Victoria Street East.

A motion was also passed that weight restrictions governing the highways be made applicable to the town's streets as well, when these go into effect this spring.

Noted was given by Coun. Robert Carruthers that a bylaw will be introduced at the next meeting for the purpose of setting tax rates. Mr. Carruthers was appointed assessor for the current year.
