

# Old Rags Sold As Quality Linen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senator John J. Williams (R-N.Y.) told the Senate Monday "gullible administrators" of U.S. foreign aid paid \$1,550,985 for \$40,000 worth of old rags delivered to Iran as fine quality textiles. He said one of the men involved in the deal was indicted on charges in 1961, but has not yet been tried, but has done further business with the U.S. government and was allowed to apply for a federal subsidy for his shiplines. Williams said final action was not taken on the subsidy request. Williams protested someone seemed to have been "extremely lax" about protecting the U.S. taxpayers' interests. The senator said that the rags were substituted for fine fabrics in foreign aid shipments.

Williams inserted in the congressional record an article from the July 1 issue of the New York Times reporting Aadal had just been arrested on charges of falsifying bills of lading on a shipment of steel in Pakistan. **BIG INVESTOR** Britain is the biggest foreign investor in the United States.

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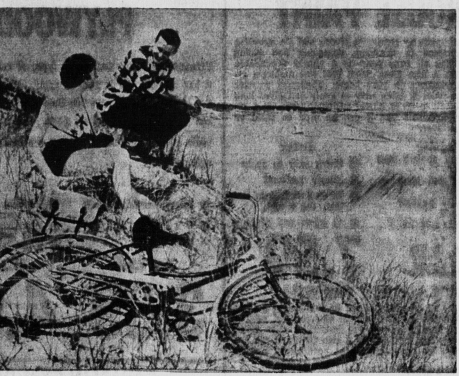
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
