St. Paul's Church, Banff Has Many Summer Visitors

The Presbyterian Church in Canada was formed in 1875 by the union of several Presbyterian bodies developed through the earlier years. The first Presbyterian services in Banff were held in 1867, and in the following year, as a venture of faith, the original St. Paul's Church was built on the corner of Lynx and Bear Streets.

Forty years later, largely through the efforts of Dr. D.G. McQueen of Edmonton, the present prominent site was secured and a new church building was erected in 1910. The original building was moved from its old location and joined to the rear of the new Church and is now used as a Church Hall.

Two of the many outstanding ministers who have served St. Paul's were Dr. Charles W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) who was stationed in Banff from 1890 to 1893, and Dr. T. Wardlaw Taylor, for over twenty-five years clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada who began his ministry in St. Paul's, Banff.
