Teaching Is No Work For A Weaking, Educators Told

Despite the unfavourable weather and travel conditions, a large audience at the Prince of Wales College last night heard the address of Harry M. Grant, M.A., Assistant Superintendent of Schools for Moncton, N.B. as part of an educational program presented by the Charlottetown and Charlottetown Rural Branches of the P.E. Island Teachers Federation. He spoke on "Prestige for the teaching profession."

Following introductory remarks by Chairman H.H. Jenkins, Queen Charlotte High School, a pleasing musical program was carried out in which pupils of the City Schools took part.

The presentation was under the distinguished patronage of His Honour Lieutenant Governor T.W. L. Prowse and Mrs. Prowse, who were in attendance, Premier A.W. Matheson and Mrs. Matheson. His Worship Mayor J. David Stewart and Mrs. Stewart. In the absence of the Mayor, His Worship was represented by Councillor Frank G. O'Neill, who was accompanied by Mrs. O'Neill, W.C. Alan Macmillan, Air Aide to the Lieutenant Governor was in attendance, accompanied by Mrs. Macmillan.

A reception was held in the college library at the conclusion of the address by Mr. Grant.

MR. GRANT

"Teaching is no work for a weaking," said Mr. Harry M. Grant in the course of his address. "A strong will is essential for success. It is human and natural for the pupil to resist the teacher to a certain extent, and it is probably ingraining for both of them. True education is a sort of compromise between the exertion of determined guidance and the development of intelligent independence."

"Prestige," he said, developing his theme, "like happiness is a sort of by-product of a way of living, and also like happiness, is likely to elude those who seek it most diligently. Unless you are convinced that the work in which you are engaged is the most important in its widest interpretation, of any work in the world, you very probably cannot be expected to undergo the necessary 'toil, blood, sweat and tears' to make a success of it."

The first requirement he said was that the educator himself be a person of well-rounded education, trained in language, the basic medium of communication and reception. He is able to think independently, will recognize the menace to intellectual development of prejudiced ideas. The unlearned man expects to find a pill for every ill, be it physical, mental or moral. "In our own case we put faith in 'scientific' methods to overcome difficulties rooted in the very nature of children, whom

FEDERATION BRIEF

It is not the intention to comment on the subject material contained in the brief recently presented to the Premier and Members of the Legislature. The material has been carried by the press and those interested may form their own conclusions. However, the presentation is surrounded by circumstances which set it in a special category. Briefs are usually presented and representations made by delegations to the Cabinet. The Federation meets the members and may later as circumstances indicate discuss with appropriate Ministers or with the Cabinet questions raised in the brief. There will, of course, always be those who wonder if such briefs serve a useful purpose and some will state that they do not. The Federation has been presenting briefs for upwards of ten years and it is interesting to review those of the past and note the number of recommendations and suggestions that have eventually been implemented or have become Government policy.

Governments are constituted - at least democratic ones - by the people to give expression and reality to their ideas of how the affairs of the country should be conducted. The government goes on 365 days of the year and the people are involved everyday, not just at election time, and their interest should be evident at all times. Generally, governments appreciate and value the recommendations of responsible groups.

FARMER'S WEEK

The following two days, Thursday and Friday will be taken over by the Fatstock Show and Sale where the lovers of good beef cattle will display the results of their skill and care for the approval of judges and buyers.

The Fatstock Show demonstrates the perfection that may be attained through attention to breeding and careful feeding and in addition, suggests that there is great room for improvement in the type and quality of our meat cattle. This matter is of considerable importance when it is realized that there is a market in Nova Scotia for at least fifty million pounds of beef per year.

Death At Mount Stewart Of Well Known CNR Man

The death of Harry W. MacKay, well known railwayman, occurred suddenly at his residence in Mt. Stewart at an early hour on the morning of March 8, 1956.

Mr. MacKay, who had retired on pension from the Railway in June 1950 owing to a heart condition, had continued to be enjoying relatively good health under the relaxation incident to retirement, had a set-back on Wednesday which rendered him bedfast. During the early morning following a further attack proved fatal.

Mr. MacKay was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth S. MacKay, and was born at Summerfield on June 27, 1890. He entered the Service of the Canadian National Railway on May 14, 1909 as a Telegraph Operator at Mt. Stewart. After filling the position of Relief Operator at many stations throughout the province, Mr. MacKay was appointed Station Agent at Mt. Stewart on Nov. 4, 1915, where he remained until retirement on pension on June 30, 1950.

Mr. MacKay took an active interest in the welfare movements in the Community and as a member of St. John's United Church, filled many important positions, notably that of Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, which he recently relinquished.

He is survived by his wife, the former Doris Toombs, daughter of the late Dr. and Mrs. Toombs, of Mt. Stewart, and one sister, Mrs. Russell Clarke, who also resides in Mt. Stewart.

Date-Orange Pudding

Combine in a greased casserole (6-cup size) ¼ c. corn syrup, 1 tbs. grated lemon rind and ½ c. orange juice. Preheat oven to 375° (moderately hot). Mix and sift once, then sift into a bowl, 1 ½ c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 ½ c. once-sifted all-purpose flour), 2 ½ tps. Magic Baking Powder, ½ tsp. salt and ¼ c. fine granulated sugar. Mix in ¾ c. corn flakes, slightly crushed, and ½ c. cut-up pitted dates. Combine 1 well-beaten egg, ½ c. milk, ½ tsp. vanilla and 3 tbs. shortening, melted. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly. Turn into prepared dish. Bake in preheated oven, about 40 minutes. Serve warm, with pouring cream. Yield—6 servings.

Four Plan Another Attempt To Cross Atlantic On Raft

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—Four current of the Gulf Stream to help men who almost drowned trying to cross the Atlantic on a raft plan to try it again.

The crew of the raft 'Egare I', which foundered and sank in a storm at Sculpine Cove, Nfld., last Aug. 16, said here Thursday they'll sail from Halifax harbor on the 3,000-mile voyage in a new raft (two or three months hence).

The intrepid quartet arrived here from Montreal Tuesday and pitched their tent in the yard of the Dartmouth marine railway. They'll camp there while building the 'Egare II'.

Henri Beaudout, 29, is captain and navigator. His crew are Jose Martinez, 31, cook; Marc Modena, 29, radioman; and Gaston Vanacker, 25, cameraman. All were born in France.

"We want to prove we can go to Europe on a primitive raft," said Martinez, "with only the wind and

"We're taking a little meat," said Martinez, "but we hope to catch enough fish to keep us fed most of the time."

They'll carry both movie and still cameras and a two-way radio.

This time they will be better prepared for disaster with a four-man rubber dinghy and a "Gibson Girl" radio for S O S signals.

"We hope we don't have to use either," Beaudout grinned.

"We don't know where we'll land," said Martinez. "It may be Scotland, Ireland, France — anywhere on the continent."

Wherever it is they plan to return to Canada, their new home, the quickest way.
