BULLETINS FROM BIRDLAND



Man persists in interfering with nature, thereby spoiling balance. Several American bird importations are being closely watched by naturalists, and for some little time it has been realized that at least two are "mistakes" on our part.
Away back in 1600 Lescarbot wrote that Eagles were brought from France to Port Royal (the present-day Annapolis Royal). In 1608 Champlain called his house "The Dovecot." As the domestic Pigeon is actually a descendant of the Rock Dove of Europe, we must infer that the two references are to the same species. Now, although many people feed the numberless Pigeons, or Rock Doves, as by rights they should be called, over cities and towns are pretty well overrun with these early importations. Every large public building seems to have its own large flock; and many complaints are made by unhappy individuals who say that Pigeons nesting just outside their bedroom windows waken them with mournful cooing.
No one needs to be told that North America is full of English Sparrows. But everyone may not be aware that these birds were brought across the Atlantic exactly 100 years ago. In 1853 eight pairs were introduced into New York state, and liberated in the spring of 1851. It was not until 1864, however, that they were started in Canada, in Quebec City, but by 1870 they had worked their way west as far as Montreal. Before the beginning of this century both ornithologists and agriculturists knew, too late, that the English Sparrow's spread was to the detriment of song birds and the dismay of grain growers.
Pheasants were introduced into the New World from England near the close of the 18 century died out. The first really successful attempt seems to have been in 1880 now our North America Pheasants are hybrids. The white ring on the neck is evidence of their east China origin. When "planted" where they can get suitable covers, they thrive. The latest report from Pelee calls them parasites, laying their eggs in nests of Ducks, Rails, Ruffed Grouse, and Partridges.
It is hard to believe that the European Starling was brought to New York as late as 1890. When this species becomes established anywhere, it takes over every available nesting spot about our buildings. Even English Sparrows appear to lose their hold. Quickly the Starlings have spread north and west. The latest report, coming from Vancouver Island, reads "On September 6, 1951 two were recorded at Victoria, B. C."
