

Local and Other Items.

BADLY NEEDED—Rain.

SUGAR.—The Moncton refinery is making a large shipment of sugar to Winnipeg and points further west. A lot of four car loads is being forwarded to Winnipeg this week.—Times.

ARRIVED.—The steamer William arrived from Cow Bay, C. B., last evening, with a cargo of slack and round coal, after discharging which she will load with produce for Boston.

DEATH OF CLAUDE DEHAVEN.—Claude DeHaven, editor and proprietor of the Providence Independent, died at that place a few days ago. Mr. DeHaven visited this city several years ago as the agent of a circus.

FOUND DEAD.—Michael Keefe, an old man of sixty years, was found dead on Citadel Hill, Halifax, on Thursday night. He had spent the previous night in the police station for protection. Heart disease was the cause of death.

SUMMER TRAVEL.—The number of passengers coming from Boston by the International Steamship Company's boats is steadily increasing. Yesterday over 100 came by the State of Maine.—St. John Telegraph. What about the exodus now?

GOLD.—The Halifax Herald's New Glasgow correspondent writes: A brick of gold was brought to town a few days ago from the Egerton gold mines. Fifteen miles stream, containing 105 ounces, and valued at \$2,100; the product of three weeks work.

FOR HALIFAX.—The steamer M. A. Starr, Capt. Ferguson, sailed for Halifax via intermediate ports at six o'clock last evening. She took a cargo of potatoes, oats, lobsters, etc., and Capt. R. McDonald and Mrs. C. Benoit and two children went as passengers.

AGRICULTURAL.—It has been decided to form a joint stock company, with a capital of \$50,000, to establish a school of agricultural and practical science in Kingston, Ont. The shares are fixed at \$25, the profits to be used in promoting the interests of the college.

COTTON SHIPMENTS.—The Cotton Company of Windsor, Nova Scotia, shipped, some days ago, a carload of cotton goods all rail to Vancouver, to go thence by steamer to China. The shipment consisted of 140 bales, weighing 35,000 pounds, and its destination is Shanghai.

CITADEL HILL.—The Herald says that the latest military order in Halifax prohibits the public from walking on Citadel Hill. This will be very unpleasant news to the many persons who are in the habit of mounting the hill in order to obtain a better view of the surrounding country.

TO-MORROW.—Preaching in the Y. M. C. A. Hall to-morrow at 11 o'clock and at 6.30 o'clock, by Rev. Edward Whitman, pastor of the Baptist Church. Theme in the morning: "The sunny side of life, or our sources of comfort," and in the evening, "The hindrances of life and how they may be overcome." All are invited.

FAREWELL CONCERT.—The Wizard Oil Concert Co. close their season in this city to-night. During the past three weeks they have given a concert each evening, delighting large numbers of people. They have also given away many valuable presents, and to-night offer a diamond ring and water pitcher. Last night the gold watch was won by Mr. W. W. Beer.

AN EXCURSION.—The new English Church, at Long Creek, will be opened on Wednesday evening next, June 12, by Bishop Courtney, who will administer the rite of Confirmation and preach. A collection will be taken up in aid of the Building Fund. Several other clergymen will be present. The steamer Southport has an excursion to West River on the same day.

THE RIFLE.—The inter-provincial rifle match comes off at Bedford Range, Halifax, on Thursday next. The New Brunswick team is made up as follows: Lt. A. Smith, and Capt. J. T. Hart, rifles; Sergt. W. H. Adams, 62nd; Corp. J. Beatty, and Pte. C. Burns, 62nd; Lt. Col. Boer, 74th; and Cpt. J. M. Kannear, 74th; and Sergt. D. M. Loggie, 93rd. The Halifax team has not been selected yet.

ANOTHER BIG STEAL.—A short time ago Mrs. Richard Thorne, of Lower Spring Park Road, put \$400 in the safe in her bedroom. Last evening she opened the safe and found that some one had stolen the money therefrom. She always kept the key of the safe in her dress pocket, and it is supposed that some person who was aware of this fact stole it while she slept, and opened the safe. The thief was evidently well acquainted with the premises.

FIREMEN'S CELEBRATION.—The prize fund for the Fredericton celebration on Dominion Day, is assuming large proportions. Among the contributions are a gold watch and a silver ice pitcher. Handsome money and other prizes will be offered in all the competitions, and word is being received from every quarter that crowds of people are going to the celebration. Some twenty outside companies will take part in the proceedings, and the Mayors of the different cities in New Brunswick and Maine are to be invited to attend.

Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, June 8.

It is rumored on good authority here that the Hon. Mr. McLeelan has been offered the Lieut-Governorship of Nova Scotia, which will be vacant next month. It is understood that Mr. Dewdney will become Supt. General of Indian Affairs as well as Minister of the Interior. It is expected that he will take charge of his department in the first week in July.

The rumor that an agreement had been arrived at with the U. S. Government in regard to the Behring Sea difficulty is premature. Negotiations are still in progress between the Imperial and American Governments, but no decision has yet been arrived at.

The Marine Department has decided to award the owners of the bark Wolfe, of Halifax, \$50 for damages to the life boat, a binocular glass to the Captain, a silver watch to the mate and a handsome gratuity to each of the crew for their bravery in rescuing the crew of the disabled brig. W. C. Warner, of Digby, in April last.

Rev. Mr. Longley Suspended.

NORWICH, Conn., June 8.

Nearly the whole of to-day's session of Niagara Methodist Conference was taken up with the case of Rev. Mr. Longley who made a long and affecting statement, confessing his deep penitence for his error, and pleading for mercy. The Toronto district's resolutions for his expulsion were rejected, there being only twelve votes for it; and by a vote of 56 to 40 a resolution was carried suspending him from the ministry for one year.

Railway Accident.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 8.

A party of five Spaniards entered a car on the inclined railway on the Canadian side this forenoon, during the absence of the attendant. The car, with the weight of the party, descended at a terrific rate of speed, and when it reached the bottom, crushed into a wooden structure below, injuring the whole party, one lady so severely that she cannot recover. The names of the party cannot be ascertained at present.

Students Expelled.

QUEBEC, June 8.

A difficulty has arisen between the Rector of Laval University and a number of students as to the extra charge for gas. Twenty three students having refused to pay for extra gas they were expelled to-day and the police were called upon to see that they departed quietly, as a violent demonstration was feared.

Respectfully Declined.

TORONTO, June 8.

Dr. Daniel Wilson, President of Toronto University, has declined the honor of knighthood recently conferred upon him by the Imperial Government. He prefers not to give his reasons, but thinks the title of President of Toronto University the greater of the two, and he prefers it.

Lord Stanley's Movements.

QUEBEC, June 8.

It is now stated that on the arrival of the Sarmatian at South Quebec, Lord Stanley will land there and proceed at once by Grand Trunk to Ottawa. The ceremony of swearing in will take place in the Senate Chamber.

Convention Signed.

PARIS, June 8.

It is semi-officially stated that England has signed the Suez Canal Convention, as modified by the Porte.
