Former Georgetown Man Killed in N. S.

TRURO — Earl Glynn Stewart, a resident of Beeches Road, Pictou, was almost instantly killed at East Mountain about six miles from here on the Truro-New Glasgow highway on Saturday, Oct. 6, when the car which he was driving left the highway and rolled over in a field. The 28-year-old man, who was alone in the car at the time, died on his way to

Colchester County Hospital where he was being rushed by ambulance.

An eye-witness to the fatality was Abner Stewart, a brother of the victim, who was coming behind in another vehicle. It is believed that both were on their way to Halifax.

An inquest into the fatality was held here on Saturday night when Dr. R.F. Ross gave the cause of death as being multiple injuries. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.

The deceased man, Earl Glynn Stewart was born at Cardigan, P.E.I., and educated at Georgetown and Pictou Academies. He was employed as a shipwright at Ferguson Industries, Pictou. He was an active member of the United Pentecostal Church of New Glasgow.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Angus W. Stewart; two sisters, Geraldine and Verna, and three brothers, Abner, Preston, and Alden, all of Pictou. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon from the home of his aunt, Mrs. Harry Burke, 36 Elm Street, with Rev. Paul Berney officiating. Hymns sung were "The Old Rugged Cross" and "In the Sweet Bye and Bye." The pall bearers were Preston, Auden and Abner Stewart, Alex Robertson, Leo Foley and Mr. Brown of Halifax. Interment was made at Sea View cemetery.

All dogs have to be registered at the local veterinary centre. The speaker said many Russians find the affection for dogs in England "just a little bit incomprehensible," he added.

"A Soviet friend who visited London chuckled for long afterward at the memory of an advertisement for dog biscuits. A whole industry devoted to such delicacies amazed him."
