A NOVEL RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—A rather novel railway accident happened on the North Shore road, near Portneuf, Quebec, the other night. As the train approached the bridge the tire of one of the engine's wheels became loose, and when the centre of the bridge was reached the tire came off, and swinging round injured the boiler, stopping the engine. The train was delayed for some little time by the accident, which is said to be a novelty in railway mishaps. THE WRONG PRIZE.—At Wilkesbano, Pa., three weeks ago, John Bowman and Norah Healy, were married by Father Mack, of Allmouth. Among the guests were James Wright, of Philadelphia, to whom the bride was introduced. It is not known whether she saw him after this or not, but on last Monday evening she eloped with him, taking all her husband's money. Before leaving she left a message for her husband, saying that she had just discovered that she had drawn the wrong prize in the marriage lottery. VERY SAD NEWS.—A Truro despatch of the 24th says: Three children of a family named Hall succumbed since Friday to malignant measles, followed by pneumonia. The first, a baby, died on Friday, and yesterday two girls, aged 20 and 15 respectively, became victims of pneumonia. The family are in desolate circumstances, and friends have been compelled to secure aid to assist in burying the bodies. Considerable of a cold and hunger to-day over a report that cold and hunger had hastened the fatal results, and developments this evening seem to verify the report. The family came to Truro from Guysboro County, and have a number of relatives in various parts of the Province. THE GHOST SURRENDERED.—A despatch of the 20th gives particulars of the doings of an apparition at Midgie, Westmorland Co. N. B. A locality there has been reputed haunted and people have been afraid to go near it. At last one courageous young man concluded that he would try to find out the nature of the being that had caused so much fear, and so, armed with a gun, he approached the haunted spot when the ghost appeared as usual. He took aim and fired, with no more serious result than causing the ghost to cry out: "Don't! don't shoot, for I am— And sure enough, after laying aside his disguise, there stood not a spirit, but a well known dealer in spirits of another kind. The scare was at an end. NOISES on the ICE.—It is stated that some countrymen driving along the ice on the night that Miss Weeks was drowned, heard screams coming from the neighborhood of where the disaster occurred, but supposing that this noise was made by some boys playing thereabouts they drove on instead of turning about and enquiring into the cause of the alarm as they were at first inclined to do. Travellers are becoming so accustomed to hearing boys and young men shouting and making a noise on the ice after dark, that they pay little attention to the matter. Hence the sometimes cries of a person in distress may sometimes be mistaken for those made by foolish boys and young men, and, therefore, be forthcoming with the alacrity with which it otherwise would be. Those fond of indulging in such tricks should make a note of this, and beware of the consequences.

Tupper, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, resumed his departmental business to-day, having recovered from his recent indisposition. Prof. C. D. A special to the Mail from Washington says the interstate commerce committee of the Senate have just completed a draft of a report on the Canadian Pacific Railway, which will recommend such legislation as will bring that corporation directly under the provisions of the Interstate Commerce Act. The Extradition Treaty. WASHINGTON, March 25. The Convention supplementary to the article of the Extradition Treaty of 1842 between Great Britain and the United States was concluded at Washington on July 12th, 1889. 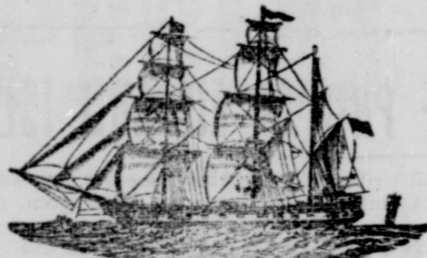
