

Theatre Society Presents 'Childhood'

The UPEI Theatre Society showed itself to be alive Tuesday noon when it presented Thornton Wilder's one-act play "Childhood".

Tracy Mahar, Robyn Hume, Nancy MacLure, Sharlene MacLean-Reno, and Ivan Dowling performed well for a crowd of approximately fifty persons. They should be commended for not allowing a noisy ceiling fan to distract their concentration. "Childhood" is a typical

Thornton Wilder enigma dealing with parent-child relationships and the morbid childhood games of the imagination.

The cast made adequate use of the lack of space available, managing to avoid confusing the audience. They also worked well with the lack of props necessary for a Thornton Wilder play.

There were a few minor flaws in the performance, Ivan Dowling, as the bus-driver, more than once,

looked away too long to realistically avoid an accident. Sharlene MacLean-Reno turned her head in response to a question that had not yet been asked. The

only major flaw was in forgetting an important section of the play.

Future Lunchtime Theatre productions are scheduled for November 13th and 26th.

U.P.E.I. woman awarded bursary

A UPEI woman was awarded one of two \$200 bursaries made available by the PEI Advisory Council on the Status of Women.

Pamela Clark, a psychology major, was presented with the bursary October 22nd. The other recipient was Maria Roberts, who is in the Commercial Design Program at Holland College. Each woman is the parent of one child whom she is supporting.

These bursaries were made available by the Advisory Council to mature women students whose education had been

interrupted for at least two years.

Eileen Wilt, Chairperson of the Council, explained "the bursaries were offered in recognition of the fact that post-secondary education is more often interrupted for women than for men and these women often face financial and other hardships in continuing their education."

While the bursaries only make a small financial contribution, the Council hopes they provide encouragement for these women in their studies.
