AQUATIC.—A London despatch of the 14th says that a match race between Mate son and George Bulear was rowed on the Thames that morning from Putney to Mortlake. Materson held the lead from the start, and beat his opponent eight lengths.

FOR ST. JOHN'S.—The steamer Cobon, Capt. Fraser, arrived here this morning from Montreal, en route for Sydney and St. John's, Nfld. She had a general cargo. After discharging the freight for this port, and taking in some for Sydney and St. John's, she will proceed to her destination.

POTATOES SCARCE.—The Bangor, Me., Commercial says that produce dealers there are sending buyers down through the Provinces, who are purchasing all the potatoes it is possible for them to get. They are paying about \$1 per barrel for Hebrons and 90 cents for Early Rose.

MORE FRAUDULENT INSURING.—It seems that the kind of insurance known as graveyard insurance, which received a severe check a few years ago, crops out now again. It is found that certain saloon keepers in Brooklyn, N. Y., have been paying the assessment of several dissipated members of the "American Legion of Honor," and, with the view of hastening their deaths and securing their benefits, plying the poor creatures with all the whiskey they could drink. What next?

NAVAL.—H. M. S. Pylades sailed from Halifax for Bermuda on the 14th, having on board a large number of the crew of the wrecked warship Lily. The crew of the Pylades will be taken to England by the troopship Himalaya, and also the men of the Lily, and paid off. The Pylades will be recommissioned. The Canada remains in Halifax until Monday next, when she will proceed to Bermuda. Her present crew will be taken to England and paid off and the ship will be recommissioned.

FISHING NEWS.—Steamer Hector has arrived at St. John's, Nfld., from Bon Esperance, Strait of Belle Isle, having been fishing since June. She hauls for 6,000 quintals for the season, which is considered a good average catch. The herring fishery however, has been very poor, the fish being very scarce both on the Labrador and Newfoundland side of the straits. Though many of the fishing districts of Nova Scotia have done poorly so far this year, some have had good success. More than \$10,000 worth of halibut has been taken by the fishermen of Cape Sable Island in a very small area.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.—The new dwelling house of Mr. James Myers, who lives about half a mile from Georgetown, on the Burnt Point Road, was burned on Monday forenoon. How the fire originated is a mystery. Mrs. Myers was in an adjoining house, digging potatoes, having left the house and her three little children in charge of a boy thirteen years of age. Fortunately, a servant coming to the house, discovered the fire, or the children might have been burnt. There was scarcely anything saved. Loss, about \$1,000. No insurance. Much sympathy is felt for the family, who, by their thrift and economy, succeeded in making a comfortable home. Mr. Myers is on his way from Newfoundland, where he has been engaged during the summer in a lobster factory.

OBITUARY.—Mr. John Nelson, well known in this city, died last night at the residence of Mr. W. N. Riggs, Kent Street. Mr. Nelson came to this city from Norway about twenty years ago and opened a hotel in the building on the corner of Great George and Dorchester streets known as the Pavilion Hotel, but changed the name to the City Hotel, by which it has since been known. After conducting his new there for several years he removed to Rustico Beach and took the management of the Ocean House, now known as the Seaside Hotel. Subsequently he returned to the city and opened a boarding house in the Hutchinson premises, corner of Pownall and Spynsey streets. Afterwards he conducted a restaurant in the basement of the market house building. Mr. Nelson had a large family. One of his sons was lost at sea a few years ago. Deceased was a member of the Masonic fraternity.

A LITTLE EXHIBITION OF HIS OWN.—Mr. B. Toombs, Moncton's enterprising seed dealer, etc., has a little exhibition of his own. The Times reports: "Mr. Toombs took in the P. E. Island exhibition and purchased quite a number of first and second prize winners. Among the lot is a mammoth Chili squash, weighing probably 60 or 70 pounds, and Boston marrow, citron and cabbage, grown by James Burke, of Charlottetown; Indian corn grown by Alex. McKinnon, carrots grown by W. Mellett, Union Road, near Charlottetown; parsnips by Wm. Frost, city; and beets grown by John Colwell, gardener to the family of the late Admiral Bayfield. There are also curly and red cabbage exhibited by Jas. Burke, some specimens of potatoes, chianagoes, beauty of Hebron and other varieties and a small lot of fruit, which is, however, now in a damaged condition. The crab apples are very fine. Mr. Toombs takes considerable interest in agricultural matters and is doing what he can to create a greater interest and more friendly competition among the farmers in the vicinity."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

What Does It Mean?

DETROIT, Oct. 15.

Considerable speculation has been excited by the following circumstances: Late Sunday night Rev. Dr. Charles O'Reilly, Treasurer of the National League Fund, received a cablegram from London. Shortly afterwards he was aroused a second time by a messenger and a telegram from Chicago delivered to him. Dr. O'Reilly arose and the telephone wires between his residence and the home of Col. John Atkinson, Irish patriot, were kept hot for nearly an hour. What passed between these men is unknown, but at 7 o'clock yesterday morning Dr. O'Reilly and Col. Atkinson started for New York to take steamer for London. It is understood they go to Europe to confer with Parnell and other leaders of the Irish movement, and it is even hinted that recent developments in the Cronin case have caused this sudden visit. That it is sudden is evinced by the fact that Father O'Reilly made no mention of any intended absence to his congregation on Sunday, and several important cases in court will necessarily be postponed on account of Col. Atkinson's absence.

The Candy Poisoning Case.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 15.

The coroner held two sessions of his court to-day. At the morning session really nothing was done beyond reading depositions. At the evening session several witnesses were examined, but nothing of an important nature was brought to light. The enquiry has been adjourned until Thursday, when it is expected some important direct testimony will be given.

The New Cable.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.

It is announced that the telegraph cable between Halifax and Bermuda will be laid next month. There is a probability that the cable will be extended to the Bahama Islands and Jamaica.
