**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

**THE BRITISH ELECTIONS.**

Special Dispatch to the *Examiner*.

OTTAWA, April 5.

The House met at 3.15, p. m. After the usual routine proceedings including a report of the Printing Committee on reaching questions to be put by members, Sir A. J. Smith asked whether it was the intention of the Government to require parties engaged in the spring herring fishery to take out a license for that purpose? Hon. J. C. Pope said it was not.

LONDON, April 4.

The *Times*' financial article this morning says the feeling of uneasiness in this city, lest parties be too evenly balanced for either to form a staple Government passed away on Saturday, and the stock markets were strong, almost buoyant.

In Edinburghshire William E. Gladstone (Liberal) is elected, receiving 1,599 votes, defeating the Earl of Dalkeith (Conservative), who received 1,368 votes.

The "Pall Mall Gazette" says: "It is estimated that the new House of Commons will consist of 317 Liberals, 271 Conservatives, and 63 Home Rulers. The Liberals will thus have a majority of 46 over Conservatives, or of 109 with the Home Rulers; but Conservative and Home Rulers combined will outnumber the Liberals by 17."

There is a reasonable hope that, in the next few weeks, there will be a satisfactory settlement and a peaceful return of our troops to India.

A report is in circulation here that Mohamed Jan has been slain, but it is not confirmed.

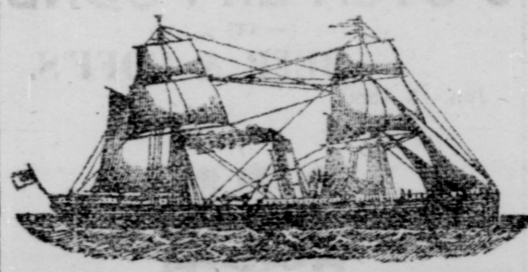
