Glac Bay Miners End Schedule With 6-3 Win Over The Islanders

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP) — Glac Bay Miners ended the regular Maritime Major Hockey League schedule at their goal-scoring peak Saturday, downing the second-place Charlottetown Islanders 6-3 in a well-played game.

Frank Roper, a junior, turned in a good game in the Charlottetown goal while regular netminder Al Millar rested. The Miners met Charlottetown in the best-of-nine semi-finals starting in Charlottetown Monday.

Glac Bay, currently the hottest team in the league, took a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals by Jim McKenzie and Ken Watson. Gordie Miller and Eddie Joss made it 4-0 in the second before Erwin Grosse tallied for the Islanders.

Junior McCallum opened for Charlottetown in the third to make it 4-2, but Neil Amadio and Pop Backer tallied while Charlottetown's only other goal came from Bob Gray.

Roper had 42 stops while Don Lockhart turned away 25.

Halifax Atlantics Whip Sydney In Rough Game

HALIFAX, (CP) — Halifax Atlantics whipped Sydney Millionaires 6-2 Saturday night in a rough, weird game which gave the Atlantics first place in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

Halifax, which led the four-team circuit all season, got into the best-of-nine semi-finals here Monday night against the last place Millionaires.

Charlottetown Islanders, beaten 6-3 by the third-place Glac Bay Miners Saturday, finished four points behind the Atlantics. They begin their series at home against Glac Bay Monday.

Halifax took a 3-1 lead in the first, added another in the second, and two to Sydney's one in the third. Ken Laufman, Billy Good, Hugh Campbell, Bob Bowness, Doug McPhee and Bill Ford scored for the winners, while Danny Wesver and Dunc McIntyre tallied for Sydney.

Twenty-two penalties were called and play was held up for more than 10 minutes in the third while officials, players and police restored order.

Bob Hayes and Johnny Morrow fought on the ice and later belted each other in the penalty box. An irate Nick Pidsodny clambered over the boards, swinging his goalie stick, threatening to strike a hooting spectator.

He received a misconduct penalty. Then he jostled with teammate McIntyre, after taking exception to some of the defence man's remarks.

Coach Johnny Horeck threw his stick and gloves high into the air. Another Sydney player hurled a towel to the ice. It was thrown back into the player's face by Halifax coach Dunc McNeil.

Whitlock Wins Maritime Scoring Championship, 11 Points Up On Watson

Roy "Buck" Whitlock, who won his fourth Maritime scoring championship and set two records over the season's play, had 55 goals and 73 assists for a total of 128 points, 73 assists or a total of 128 points during the regular schedule of the Maritime Major Hockey League.

Whitlock set a new record in winning the scoring race for the fourth time and he set another record in point scoring. His 128 points are two better than his record of 126 which he set with the Saint John Beavers in 1950-51.

Whitlock had an 11 point advantage over Billy Watson of Halifax who finished in second place with 117 points. Watson has 30 goals and 87 assists. This is a new Maritime record in assists for the slick Halifax centre-man.

Two Halifax players shared third spot in the point standings. Billy Ford scored 49 goals and 37 assists for 86 points while Billy Good had 40 goals and 46 assists for the same number of points as Ford.

Bob Bowness of Halifax edged out Marcel Clements of the Islanders for fourth place. Bowness had 82 points against 81 for Clements. Frank King of Halifax finished in sixth place with 77 points and Bob Gray of the Islanders in seventh place with 73.

Bill McCracken and Ronnie Rowe each had 71 points while "Huh" Beaudry finished ninth with 67.

QUEBEC, (CP) — Frank Byrne said Saturday his Quebec Junior A Citadelles club is for sale and made suggestions for the expansion of the Quebec Junior Amateur Hockey Association.

The peppy Citadelles' boss said the buyers could operate the Quebec club in whatever league they wished.

However, he described as "fantastic" an Ottawa report saying the new owners might operate with Shawinigan Falls, Three Rivers and four clubs in the Lake St. John area — Chicoutimi, St. Joseph d'Alma, Jonquiere and Dolbeau.

A league like that could not operate on a good junior level, he said. They would not have enough players of that calibre.

Chamberlain Cautious; Expects To Win But Predicts Tough Series

The long, hard road to the Maritime Major Hockey Championship and possibly the Alexander Trophy begins tonight with the Charlottetown Islanders playing the Glac Bay Miners here and the Halifax Atlantics meeting the Sydney Millionaires in Halifax in the best of nine series.

Main interest in the Maritimes' biggest sports event of the year will centre around the Charlottetown-Glac Bay series because of the apparent equality of the two teams. The Halifax-Sydney series is expected to take a back seat due to the superiority of the Halifax Club. However, in a play-off series anything can happen and there are some who think that Sydney may come through with what would be the upset of the year.

The Islanders and Miners will go into the series with an almost even record on the season's play. The two clubs met 28 times during the schedule with the Islanders winning half the games. The Miners won 13 games and the other contest ended in a draw.

Both clubs showed a superiority on their home ice. The Islanders defeated the Miners on nine occasions here while the Miners won eight games from the Charlottetown team at Glac Bay.

Coach Murph Chamberlain of the Islanders will shoot the works tonight to win the big opening game. The Islanders will go into the game with all players ready to play and the Miners will likely go in the same way although there is a possibility that Bill McCracken, the Miners' highest scorer, will tip in uniform.

Chamberlain expects a very tough series. Stated Murph last night:

"This will be a tough series. I think we have a good chance against them. Our defense is a little stronger than theirs and our forwards are bigger and stronger and will wear better."

The Islanders have three forwards in the persons of "Buck" Whitlock, Marcel Clements and Bob Gray who placed well ahead of any of the Miners in the league point scoring parade. In addition Al Millar, the Islanders goalie, owned the best goals-against average in the M.M.H.L. Millar beat out Don Lockhart of the Miners for this honor.

The Islanders returned from New Glasgow by plane around noon yesterday and had a good start last night. The Miners will fly in early today by a chartered flight.

The teams wound up the schedule Saturday night at the Bay with the Miners taking a 6-3 win. The Islanders used several local players and Frank Roper in particular played an outstanding game according to coach Chamberlain. Roper made 42 stops in the Islanders' cage.

Both teams played well in the weeks preceding the play-off. The Miners came from deep in the cellar to spurt within ten points of the Islanders while the local team finished only four points behind the League leaders.

The games will be handled under the two-man referee system. The referees for the individual games had not been allocated yesterday.

The Miners have been noted for their defensive style of play. Throughout the season they have been content to play a waiting game and throw up a stout defense in front of Don Lockhart. Their defence centres around their centreman, Kenny Watson, Eddy Joss and playing coach Hub Macey.

The Islanders, on the other hand like to play it wide open. They excel at passing attacks and have several very competent goal scorers. In addition they possess the best defense in the League.

Forum Manager Bill Brown reported a "wonderful" sale of seat tickets on Saturday. He stated that standing room tickets would not go on sale until all the seat tickets are sold.
