ECHOES OF THE DREYFUS TRIAL

Excitement in European Capitals.

STRONG PROTEST IN ROME—POPE WRITES A LETTER

Demonstrations in Berlin and London—Paris Exposition Threatened.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Sept. 12.—A special despatch from Rome says that the sentence pronounced against Dreyfus has produced an enormous excitement there and that thousands of telegrams of sympathy have been sent to Dreyfus.

According to the same despatch the Pope sent a long telegram to President Loubet.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Congressman Levy has announced that as soon as Congress meets he will introduce a resolution asking for the withdrawal of the support of this government from the Paris exhibition on account of the Dreyfus verdict.

BERLIN, September 12.—The private agitation against the Paris Exposition is beginning to find vigorous expression.

LONDON, September 12.—A demonstration of sympathy for Dreyfus has been projected for next Sunday in Hyde Park.

RENNES, September 12.—The judges of the Dreyfus court martial, by mutual agreement, have expressed to the President of the Republic their sincere desire that Dreyfus shall not be submitted to a fresh degradation.

GOLD THE LEGAL TENDER.

No Other Measure Would Save Save India From Embarrassment.

Simla, September 11.—At a recent session of the India Council, the Viceroy, Baron Curzon of Kedleston, concurred in the statement of Mr. Clinton Dawkins, the financial member, who, in introducing the Currency bill, said that in the absence of the mint proclamation from England it had been decided to make gold the legal tender immediately, in the conviction that no other measure would save India from disastrous embarrassment and fresh taxation, and remarked that thanks to the sagacity and common sense of the committee, the ability of the chairman, the strength of the case for the good standard, and the remarkable consensus of opinion, the fiercely disputed matter had been the defence of India from the inevitable consequences of the decline in the value of the rupee, namely fresh taxation. The adoption of a gold standard would enable India to embark in discussion with foreign powers and enter the field on equal terms. Since gold began to enter last year £2,620,000 had arrived. A fixed value must lend stability and confidence to foreign trade. He did not indulge in chimerical dreams of the future or pretend to open an Asiatic Klondyke. He firmly believed and hoped the present action would invest the financial horoscope of India with the security which it had hitherto lacked, and which it was the duty of the Government to utilize in the interests of the Indian people.

Reply Post Cards for Great Britain

MUST BEAR AN ADDITIONAL ONE CENT STAMP

Putting up the Rate on Suburban Letters.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, Sept. 12.—The Post Office Department here has been advised by the Imperial authorities that a Canadian reply post card will be recognized in England if bearing a two cent stamp. There is no two cent reply post card issued by the Dominion department and it will therefore be necessary for parties desiring to use this class of communication to affix a one cent stamp to each card.

The announcement is made by the Post Office Department that on and after October first, the suburban letter rate of one cent per ounce will be abolished and the letter rate made uniformly two cents per ounce for the whole of Canada.
