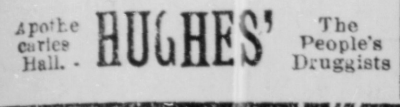

What "Dear Little Buttercup" Says About Thistle down

Thistle-down is a near neighbour of ours. But we do not like him at all. He is a disagreeable, cantankerous old fellow, ugly, worn out and seedy, and all he cares for is to perpetuate his own family.

He is pleased with what he calls the "Memorial Fence" just because it protects his ugly family of Thistles. Now, I do not pretend to admire the fence, but, no doubt it will comfort some of the poor people when wood runs short, next winter; it is said that coal will be very high. For my part, I am not sorry that such nice, dry material is so close at hand.

I am only a simple little buttercup, but I do think that Thistle Down is altogether too severe about the Brighton Bridge. The old wooden bridge was in a deplorable condition, and it was high time that a new one was put in the place of it. The new bridge is a great improvement on the old one, and it is very unfair to judge anything before it is finished.

If you stand on the end of the platform by the house lately occupied by Mr. McLeod, and imagine a bee line drawn to the end of the old drain on Euston Street, you will see that a great deal of filling up has to be done before the place is even decent. But I do not in the least doubt that when the time comes it will be done, and the iron railing that they are providing will be placed much further back than the temporary wooden rail, which stands there at present.

The town has improved very much in the last few years. The post office, law courts, police station, Prince of Wales College and other important buildings have been erected. The public squares have been levelled and planted with trees. I deem, part of Queen Square with its fountain, pretty flower beds and seats would be an ornament to any city. In many of the streets, the trim looking grass plots on the sides and protected trees, as well as the better conditions of the road way, shows that our city councillors are trying to make Charlottetown as attractive as possible.

Our streets are lighted by electricity; the houses are abundantly supplied with the purest and best water found in any part of the world. Last year an excellent system of drainage was carried to a successful issue. This year an expensive steam machine has been imported for rolling the streets and keeping them in good condition. The building of the bridge on Brighton Road has been undertaken, and if the citizens will only have patience I am quite sure that it and all its surroundings will be made pleasing to the eye and conducive to the health of the town. But all these improvements take time and money. "Rome was not built in a day," and we must not expect these things to be done by magic. Wait a while. The bridge will be nicely finished, the pond will be cleared out, a new road will be opened from the Governor's Bridge to Brighton Road, on the margins of Government House, which, at present, is not used at all. On sides of the banks lining the pond will be planted with handsome trees, the buttercups, daisies and violets will hold up their pretty faces to the sky, "flowery, wild and sweet," little children will be sailing tiny boats, in summer, on the gently flowing stream, and in winter the people who cannot afford to buy tickets for the rink will be seen here skimming over the frozen surface, care and poverty all forgotten, while life and health bloom in their rosy cheeks.

Is this too much to hope for?

AFTER LIQUOR SELLERS—A Sydney despatch says: Thirty-five liquor dealers have been fined \$50 each in town since the 15th August. A crusade against the liquor dealers is being carried on in the mining districts at the instance of the Dominion Coal company.

POLICE COURT.—This morning two lads named Anselm Morgan and Eusebe Carroll, aged respectively nine and ten years, were before the court charged with breaking and entering Sanderson & McNutt's grocery store in the Morris Block, Saunders & Newscm's meat shop in the east end of the Market House and Blake Bros. shop in the west end of the same building. Officer Carter arrested the lads this morning at 1.30 in the entrance to the office of the School Board Secretary. After the arrest on being searched, about 60 cents were found hidden in their boots. On being asked the usual questions they both admitted their guilt and were remanded to jail to await their trial in Supreme Court.

RECEPTION FOR THE BOYS.—The meeting of the militia officers to have been held last night stands adjourned until Saturday next at the same hour, when arrangements will be completed for the reception of "our boys." It is proposed to have the returning soldiers arrive in Charlottetown about half-past seven o'clock in the evening, if arrangements to that end can be completed. They will probably come by the Princess which will be conveyed by the Acadia and either the Curlew or the Stanley. It is understood that the return fare to Halifax on the occasion will be \$3.50 the same rate as prevailed during exhibition week. If enough excursionists from outside Charlottetown offer it is probable that the local railway authorities will make special arrangements for their conveyance.
