B.C. PROFESSOR AGED 37 SHOOTS AND KILLS HIMSELF

VANCOUVER, B.C., June 2.—Gordon Charles Davidson, aged 37 professor in history in the University of British Columbia, shot and killed himself today a few hours before he was to have left for a trip to his old home in Union, Ontario, where his parents and one brother now live.

Miss McCormick, whose return is supposed to relate to the guardianship proceedings in the probate court in which her mother, Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick, intervened, was met at the railroad station by her father, Harold F. McCormick, president of the International Harvester Company.

"I've been bothered to death," the girl said. "I have nothing to say. I have no explanation to make of my return."

Miss McCormick smiled nervously and twined her handkerchief as she spoke.

Mr. McCormick, who on his own application was appointed his daughter's guardian several days ago, greeted Mathilde with a kiss, and a "Hello darling, so glad to see you back," but he too, refused to discuss Mathilde's affairs.
