Royals Take Final Game; Rangers Next On Schedule

Charlottetown Royals defeated the Charlottetown Bombers 5-2 last evening to win the semi-final series of the N. S. - P. E. I. Senior Hockey Title in what turned out to be a fast and rugged encounter. The Royals now meet the New Glasgow Rangers in the finals with the first three contests of this series expected to take place on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next week at the Charlottetown Sports Arena.

The Charlottetown Bombers scored two unanswered goals in the first period with Kip Ready and Merrill Pineau doing the honors. Madinsky and Roper, the contending goalies, made some beautiful saves but the Bombers couldn't hold off the goal-hungry Royals.

The Bombers pulled up from behind in the opening seconds of the second period with MacCarron scoring the first one for the Cape Bretoners at the 32 mark of the period and the tying goal was fired 1.0 minutes later by MacLellan. Andrea, spectacular forward for the Cape Breton squad, assisted on both goals. Spy Ready put the Royals in the lead late in the sandwich session, on his own rebound.

In the final period the Royals again scored two unanswered goals with the line of Spy Ready, Pineau and Carroll doing the honors. The first of these two goals was scored by Spy Ready at the 13:03 mark and less than twenty seconds later Angie Carroll scored the final goal of the game to give the Royals a 5-2 win. For the remainder of the game the Bombers tried hard to catch up to the fast-moving Charlottetown squad but they were tiring fast and showing the effects of this rugged encounter.

The Cape Bretoners had a streak of bad luck in the second period of this exciting game as they seemingly had it all over the Royals and had it not been for the magnificent net-minding of Roper, the Charlottetown goalie, the Bombers would in all probability, have had a strong lead at the end of this session.

Leonard Opens Defence Of Title

GREENSBORO, N. C. (CP)—Veteran Stan Leonard opens a four-day defence today of his only major golf victory of the last 12 months — the \$15,000 greater Greensboro open.

The 41-year-old, Vancouver-born pro is rated one of the leading contenders for first place money, but there is plenty of top-flight talent among the expected 135 starters.

Ageless Sam Snead will be seeking to win the event for the seventh time. Arnold Palmer, newly-crowned Masters champion, won't be present, but Ken Venturi, Art Wall, Doug Ford, Julius Boros, Mike Souheak and Billy Maxwell will.

Leonard won the event — and the \$2,000 first money — last year with a four-under-par 276 He has picked up more than \$5,500 so far over the circuit this year, with his best performance in the Masters where he tied with Venturi for fourth place, only two strokes back of Palmer.

FOUR TROUGH HOLES

Leonard rates the first four holes in the 6,700-yard, 35-36-71 course the toughest. Host pro Charlie Farlow has called these same holes the "ones to separate the men from the boys and bring the cream to the top."

One, two and four are par fours. The third is par three. A bad shot on any of them can and has spelled disaster.

Ben Hogan has called the fourth hole one of the toughest.

Folley-Machen Fight To A Draw

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Heavyweights Zora Folley and Eddie Machen, the top ranking contenders for the heavyweight title, battled to an unpopular draw in a 12-round bout in the Cow Palace Wednesday night.

Folley, from Chandler, Ariz., and veighing 194, built up a solid lead at the start with his stiff jabs but the finishing spurt of the 191½-pound Machen from Redding, Calif., influenced referee Frankie Carter who voted for him.

Machen, the No. 1 contender, was a 2½-to-1 favorite over the No. 2 ranked Folley when the two Negro fighters entered the ring.

Machen, who had won all his 24 fights, appeared confused by the jabbing of Folley and unable to move in. He did not land damaging blows until the bout was half over.

The crowd of 12,000 in the Cow Palace frequently booed the slow action and loudly booed the draw decision. Referee Carter scored 117 to 116 for Machen, Judge Jack Downey saw it a 115-115 draw and Judge Fred Apostol, former middleweight champion, scored for Folley 117-115.

The AP score card had Folley ahead 117-116.

Folley's manager, Bill Swift, indicated he would enter a protest with the California athletic commission.

The draw was the second in the career of the 26-year-old Folley who went into the fight with a 39-2-1 record.

It also added further confusion to the heavyweight picture.

The winner, had there been one, planned an immediate challenge to champion Floyd Patterson.

There were no knockdowns although Folley slipped to his knees and caught a couple of punches there in the 10th round. In the 11th, Folley slammed a right that stopped Machen in his tracks but the Californian surged back with a flurry of solid lefts and rights that forced Folley to hang on.

"When they start talking in terms of the \$70,000 Bassey received against Ricardo Moreno of Mexico, then we will start listening," Biddles said.

Bassey stopped Moreno in Los Angeles last week.
