REV. HOWARD SPRAGUE is in town.  
 SENATOR HOWLAN is in the city.

 CARDINAL CAREFA DE CRAETTO is dead.  
 THE annual meeting of the P. E. I. Law Society will be held to-morrow.  
 THE Union Pacific Railroad Company has declared a quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 per cent.  
 THE examination at the Normal School, for teachers' licenses, commenced on Saturday morning.  
 THE barque *Lizzie Cameron*, from Rouen, France, called at this port to-day, and left again for Pictou.  
 THE Rev. N. C. Boudreault, P. P., has returned from a trip to the Magdalen Islands, much improved in health.  
 FIVE villages and the town of Catania, on the east coast of Sicily, have been destroyed by an earthquake.  
 THE Station House at Alberton was broken into on Sunday night last, and a sum of money stolen from the safe.  
 ON Friday night last the jewelry store of S. F. Shute, at Fredericton, N. B., was burglarized and \$400 worth of goods taken.  
 THE *Freemason* says reports from the fishing stations represent that mackerel have been in and are unusually large and plentiful.  
 THE M. W. Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. will hold its annual communication to-morrow, Tuesday, the 24th, at Masonic Hall, commencing at half past two o'clock.  
 MR. NICHOLSON, M. P. P. for Belfast was in town to-day, on his way home from Ottawa where he has been attending the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church.  
 AROUND THE WORLD IN A BOAT.—A Halifax despatch says that the Danish boat, *Uncle Sam*, in a voyage around the world, arrived there on Friday, from Boston.  
 IT is now stated on the streets that Col. Gray is to be our next Governor. On Saturday it was reported that the Hon. D. Davies was likely to be the lucky man.  
 WM. MCKECHNIE, Esq., late Superintendent of our railway, has purchased from Hudson's Bay Company a section of land located a few miles west of Emerson, Manitoba, for \$5,000.—*Pat.*  
 IN the *Wesleyan* this week, the Rev. A. W. Nicholson, who has been the chief editor for the past six years, publishes his "valedictory" to the readers of that journal. Rev. D. D. Currie succeeds Rev. Mr. Nicholson.

 DISORDERLY DRIVING is again becoming all too common. On Saturday evening a person returning to town had his carriage run into and damaged by the truck wagon of a drunken man on his way home from the groggeries of the city.  
 A PICNIC, in aid of the new Catholic Church at South Shore, was held at Rocky Point to-day. The steamer *Southport* made three trips between the city and the grounds. A large number of citizens attended, and, we learn, spent a pleasant day.  
 THE Happy foot race which was to have taken place at Moosepath Park, N. B., on Friday, did not come off. Robinson failed to put up his final deposit, and, therefore, forfeited to Happy the money deposited at first, the amount of which was \$10.  
 By telegrams to I. C. Owen we learn that the barque "Wille McLaren," McLaren master, arrived at Sandy Hook, on 22nd inst., from Newry; and that the barque "William Owen," McPherson master, arrived at Fort Mearoe, on the 22nd inst; from Honfleur.  
 THE Supreme Court meets in this city to-morrow. About ninety civil and five criminal cases are on the docket. The criminal cases are: three larcenies, one assault and one attempt at rape. The Court will meet in King's County on the 15th of July next.  
 At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, Thomas Euman—a boy apparently sixteen years of age—was fined \$6, or one month's imprisonment, for being drunk and using profane language on the streets; Michael Reilly (sailor), drunk and incapable, was fined \$2 and costs, or 8 days.  
 "FEARE'S DIRECTORY OF PICTOU AND NEW GLASGOW" is at hand. It is the first work of its kind, exclusively local, ever published in Pictou County; and it reflects great credit upon the compiler and the printer. From it one may learn all about the business men of the place worth knowing.  
 THE Bishop of Nova Scotia is expected to arrive here on Friday next, and on the same evening will preside at the review of St. Peter's Schools. On Saturday evening he will administer Confirmation in St. Peter's Church; and on Sunday morning will consecrate the Church, which lately has been completed. A large number of clergy from the other Provinces is expected to be in attendance.  
 THE *Progress* well says:—"It is time this talk about 'Catholic vote' and 'Protestant vote' was dropped. Catholics appreciate good Government and dislike corruption in official quarters, quite as much as any other class of electors, and it is generally, if not always, found that as the great majority of Protestants vote—where there is no religious issue—so also vote the Catholics. All are guided by the same motive, viz.—to secure honesty and efficiency in the management of public affairs."  
 ATKINSON'S *ante mortem* deposition was taken at Sackville on Friday, but he was much easier on Saturday morning, and there are prospects that his life may be saved. He suffers comparatively little pain and is able to converse freely. He thinks that the shot was intended for him and that the assailant was not mistaken in the man. He estimates the distance at twenty-five or thirty yards. The authorities have no further information regarding the assailant. The general opinion is that if caught he should be hanged, whether Atkinson lives or dies.
