Painting On Inspection At Alberton

"Resetting For The Races" a painting just completed by the Alberton-born artist Hubert Rogers for the Canadian Club in New York was on display in Alberton public library Thursday afternoon. Some interested persons motored from as far as Summerside to join the throng of visitors from Alberton and Alberton South who called to the library to view a familiar scene depicted on canvas.

"Resetting For The Races" has for its setting the Alberton harbour. In the foreground are a number of fishermen and their boats which have been beached for refitting and fitting. Just beyond them is the rail road wharf with its stacked lobster traps, canning factory and other buildings. Prominent in the background are the Alberton lighthouse and two boats speeding into harbour.

In his painting the artist has captured and depicted clearly the true atmosphere of the scene. His choice of color is striking in that each part of the entire scene is made to stand out clearly, yet those parts which are intended to have prominence do not lose their significance. It is a painting which captures the interest of the average man. It appeals to his spirit and satisfies his love of beauty.

The Regent, Miss Wanda Wyatt, introduced the guest speaker, Mrs. A. Turner Bone, of Montreal, president of the National Council of Women.

Mrs. Turner Bone has been closely associated with the many important undertakings carried out by women's organizations during the past few years and it was indeed a privilege for members of the local chapter and their guests to meet her and to hear her very interesting address.

Mrs. Turner Bone outlined the organization of the National Council of Women and spoke in detail on some of the main projects fostered by it. These are, to a considerable degree, matters which have particular application to the well-being of the citizens of this country and, as such, properly are among the first interests of the women of Canada.

At this stage in the development of the Dominion, "when we are on the verge of becoming one of the leading nations of the world, the importance of the influence of our women is particularly great," the speaker said.

The National Council of Women, with its 600,000 members, can and does make effective representations to those in authority at all levels of government and administration. Mrs. Turner Bone cited several important changes in the Criminal Code having to do with moral delinquency which were direct results of these representations.

In the past Canada has been found wanting in the manner of its absorption of immigrants into the normal stream of citizenship.

Mrs. Turner Bone urged the women to do all possible to make these strangers welcome and thus help to instill in them a sense of belonging to the country of their adoption.

The motto of the council is the golden rule and it is the test of the worthiness of all its endeavours, she said.

Miss Wyatt is a friend of Mrs. Turner Bone, and was instrumental in having her visit the province. The regular meeting opened with the reading of the minutes by the secretary, Mrs. Arthur Allen.

The purely academic nature of the present education in the City schools is forcing young people to leave as they are funneled through Grades 7, 8 and 9 on this basis without regard to their desire for creative courses, Mr. Parker said.

Three-quarters of these students do not reach Grade Eleven standards, and a great many not even Grade Ten.

"They see no future but to go to work at once," Mr. Parker continued. "It is on record and much to be regretted that enlisted men from this Province during the War were below standard in education and facilities had to be provided to bridge this fault."

He noted that there was no capital debt against the City for school facilities and regretted that no option had been taken on building lots with school expansion in view, over the past years. "We cannot afford to continue on this low level of educational facilities, something much better is the heritage of the children here," he continued. "In rural parts of the Province great advances have been made, but the city is definitely lagging behind."

ing a face-saving device to get around the Communist demand that prisoners be forced to return home, the attempts by countries such as India are considered the best method of discovering the Soviet and Chinese Communist attitude. India holds a unique position with its embassy in Peking and its middle-of-the-road outlook in the cold war.

Canada Has Special Position

Canada also has a special position in the west with Asian, Arab and other countries looking towards Canada as certainly an ally of the United States but one which is at the same time more objective towards international affairs.

Pearson has heightened the general attitude toward Canada's objectivity by cutting himself off almost entirely from the Canadian delegation now headed by Health Minister Paul Martin. The External Affairs Minister still keeps an eye on Canadian delegation moves but his main job is assembly.

The Russians at the U. N. have in past years sought Pearson as one of the major spokesmen for the West. But there has always been a hint of regret in their tone when they have hit back at his attacks on Soviet attitudes.

They obviously respect him as a diplomat, Jacob Malik says he "always listens" when Pearson speaks. "Delegates recall that Pearson was a member of the three-man cease-fire committee set up by the assembly in 1950 which was

Big Demand For Record Wheat Crop

WINNIPEG, Oct. 30 (CP) - Western Canada's record wheat crop not only has been harvested in good condition, but demand is excellent and export sales are being made in record volume.

The Wheat Board today confirmed reports that forward sales—commitments made to ship wheat to other countries in future months—are heavier than at any time in history.

The port of Vancouver is "booked solid" until the end of the crop year, July 31, 1953, and the Wheat Board said it now is turning down business calling for shipments through the Pacific coast port.

A similar situation is rapidly being reached in connection with export sales for shipment through Eastern ports.

Grain officials said Canada's commitment under the International Wheat Agreement is "just about filled, with not more than about 5,000,000 bushels remaining to be sold as wheat in the final year of the agreement."

W. C. McNamara, assistant chief of the Canadian Wheat Board, said there is a good market for wheat at "free" prices—sold outside the

finally rebuffed by the Communists. Since then the sense of urgency to end the Korean conflict has heightened in the assembly and all efforts are directed to that end.

Mme. Casgrain Addresses Students

Yesterday morning Mme. Therese Casgrain O. B. E., provincial leader of the C. C. F. in Quebec addressed the students and teachers of the High School in Summerside.

Miss Carrie Holman in introducing her said that she believed Mme. Casgrain to be the most distinguished member of a very distinguished family, and she was unique in being the first woman in Canada to be the leader of a political party.

Mme. Casgrain, who has travelled extensively in Europe since the war, contrasted the healthy happy appearance of children in England, Holland and Sweden, with that of some other countries in Europe where little was being done for the welfare of the people.

She spoke of the chief aim of education being to train young people to think for themselves, and she emphasized the necessity of cherishing the real freedoms of thought, of speech, and of action.

The chief limitation of sales was transportation. Canada started the new season with an I. W. A. commitment of 235,000,000 bushels, of which some 50,000,000 bushels was to be taken as flour.

Trade reports here today said 180,000,000 bushels of the remaining 185,000,000 bushels of wheat had been sold.
