Man Revolts Against His Wife's Constant Nagging

Dear Mary Haworth: We have been married seven years and have two lovely children. My husband is 29 and I am 37—eight years his senior—but I don't think that has any bearing on the problem.

A few days ago he informed me that he no longer cares for me; he just doesn't love me and that's final, though he will continue to live with us I told him to leave but he won't.

Life on this basis is miserable. Though he criticizes me every chance he gets, still he expects me to be a sex partner, which I cannot be while he has no affection for me. His manner is curt and cold.

I know I have been at fault. I have been a nagging complaining wife and I drove him into an affair, knowing I was doing it and unable to stop myself.

I consulted a doctor about my irritability; he said I was perfectly healthy and he couldn't help me. I continued to nag and whine and was so nervous and upset that I'd become nauseated at times. Each morning I'd vow to be pleasant and loving, but before the day's end I was back to my old wretched ways.

Perhaps my husband's stand has opened my eyes and made me a better person. Suddenly I see myself as he must have seen me all these years and I wonder how he endured me this long.

I am a new person; like people and love my husband more than ever. I try to prove my change of heart but each attempt meets with blank resistance. He is utterly indifferent; won't believe me. So why does he insist on staying? He knows he is breaking my heart.

I know I can't force him to love me. But does the situation look as hopeless as he has led me to believe? What's ahead. Do you know?—R.P.

Dear R.P.: While there is life there is hope, a proverb says. In stubbornly staying with you, after figuratively throwing love out the window, your husband indicates that he is tied to you by bonds of dependency and habits of devotion that don't sever easily.

One of the great strengths of marriage, as distinct from romantic love, is the fact that it provides a framework of social support for holding a man and wife together through stormy times—until moods change, selfishness moderates, characters mature and eventually they learn how to harvest happiness from the naturally imperfect partnership.

As you are in total darkness about what's wrong with the marriage, fundamentally, urge you to discuss the situation in depth with a family relations counselor.

It is possible that your husband is very immature psychologically, and that you are profoundly resentful of his dependency bias towards you, even though you may have maneuvered him into double harness by catering, cannily, to this needy side of his nature.—M.H.

Dear Mary Haworth: I was the only girl in a family of four

and left home when I was 16. I had to work hard and had no schooling as we were poor and my father drank heavily. Finally my parents separated and my father died young. My mother married again; but now she too is gone.

My problem is that when I left home I changed the spelling of my first name—changed two letters. I know now I shouldn't have done it; but I've never changed it back. How do I go about making it legal? Have I a right to?

I don't drink or smoke and have never had trouble with the law. This is the only wrong thing I've ever done. Please advise me.—X.Y.

Dear X.Y.: A visit to the county office that keeps birth records (or to the church that has your baptismal data), and an explanation to any staff person there, about your problem, should produce a speedy solution. The remedy is to file an affidavit, or amend the record, to show that you did revise the spelling of your first name. It wasn't a crime; but it is sensitive to clarify your identity—as the person who has used both spellings.—M.H.
