## Search For Missing Child Ends When Body Is Found

GRANVILLE FERRY, N.S. (CP) — "They've found her."

Those words brought by a messenger to a naval search party ended three days of frantic hunting for a two-year-old Alice Halliday here Monday.

Two Canadian naval ratings—Ordinary Seaman Michael Olson and John Colbary—found the little girl's wet body washed up on the south shore of Annapolis Basin at Charlottetown, a navy training establishment.

The day of frantic diving apparently carried it seven miles across the basin from this western Nova Scotia village.

Coroner Dr. Gordon Mahaney said the blonde-haired tot drowned.

"Her lungs were full of water," he explained. "There were absolutely no marks on the body that would suggest foul play."

They were watching television when Mrs. Butler stepped outside for a few minutes. She returned to find her daughter missing.

When she returned, Alice was gone. All the other children could say was that the little girl had walked out of the room. "She'd only been gone about 15 minutes when I got back from town," her mother said.

Hundreds of men, helicopters, boats and a police dog were used in the day-and-night hunt that followed. Lt. Roy Evans of Middleton, N.S., who headed about 150 navy searchers, said "we searched every inch for at least three miles every day, sometimes five or six times." Every well and several ponds in the area were pumped out. Even the hay in nearby barns was taken out.

The searchers were told where to turn next before they got the news they feared—Alice was dead.

Her father said sadly, "I think she walked out to try to find her mother. She must have fallen into a creek that flows into the basin down the road. The tide was almost high at the time."

The family lives about four miles from Port Royal Habitation, a national historic park marking the site of the first white settlement in Canada in 1605.

Coroner Mahaney will hold an inquest in Annapolis Royal Wednesday night.

## Plot Said Smashed To Shoot De Gaulle

PARIS (Reuters)—Police said Monday night they have smashed a European Secret Army plot to kill President De Gaulle last Sunday with a rifle equipped with telescopic sights.

Senior members of the plot, code-named "Chamala," have been arrested, police said. The leader of the group was identified only by his last name, Blanchy. None of the other 15 were named.

Police said the plot was discovered May 15, as the president left on a tour of the central provinces which he has since completed.

An assassin was hired to assist at a mass in Saint Etienne, France, while the president was in the area, police said, and he was equipped with a high-powered rifle and telescopic sights.

President De Gaulle was in session Monday at his Elysee Palace residence in the heart of Paris. The guard was heavily augmented around the palace walls.

SALTILLO, Mexico (AP) — "Hunger caravans" soared to 15,000 marchers Monday in trek across the desert in Mexico City. They have 430 miles to go on a journey expected to take two months.

## Survivor Of Famous Fight Dies At 96

MONTREAL (CP) — Funeral will be held today for Alfred H. Hill, 96, who battled the famed fuzzy-wuzzies as a British soldier in the Eastern Sudan in 1884. He died in hospital Saturday.

Hill was an 18-year-old serving with the King's Royal Rifles when the regiment engaged the fuzzy-wuzzies near Tamaal and a feat immortalized four years later in a poetic tribute by Rudyard Kipling.

Some years ago Hill recounted the battle of the natives were have-fused, some with flowing robes, some practically naked. Their fuzzy black hair was greased and piled up on their heads. They charged, all screaming at the top of their lungs.

Historians say that although the engagement lasted less than an hour 2,000 fuzzy-wuzzies were killed. The British lost between 100 and 200 men and had 300 killed.

Hill also served with the British army in the South African Boer War—where he won the Distinguished Conduct Medal—and with the Canadian army in the First World War, acting as a garrison sergeant-major in Halifax. He retired in 1923.

## Orbital Flight Dates Set For Thursday

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The orbital flight of astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter, postponed to Thursday because of technical problems, may run afoul of another meteor—swamp forest fire.

A fire in the Everglades 200 miles south of here and a marsh fire several miles west of the cape Monday created visibility—reducing less in the launching area.

The condition was not serious Monday, but there was a possibility it could worsen by Thursday morning, when Carpenter is to be flung toward a triple orbit of the earth.

A National Aeronautics and Space Administration weather expert said the smoky haze could prevent camera tracking of the launching. He said optical coverage is required up to 40,000 feet from widely-scattered ground cameras.

## India Delays Mig Purchase

NEW DELHI (AP) — The Indian government has put off a deal for Soviet MIG-17 jets. The Times of London said that the purchase has not been abandoned and the government still go on about negotiating the transactions, the paper says.

A government spokesman said Monday he had commented on the report except to repeat Defence Minister K. Krishna Rao's statement May 16 that "India is an independent country and military purchases are its decisions in its own way."

Reports of Indian plans to buy two squadrons of MIG-17 fighter planes caused concern among U.S. officials, who feared the purchase represented a serious adverse effect on members of Congress, who vote U.S. aid funds for India.
