NAVAL.—The British warship Pylades arrived at Halifax on Wednesday. She is 1420 tons, and carries a crew of 151 men. The French warship Arethuse, bearing the flag of the Admiral of the North Atlantic squadron, has also arrived at this place from Antigonish, via Bermuda. Her tonnage is 3,300, and she is heavily armed. There are now four British and two French warships in Halifax. The former are the Blake, Magicienne, Canada and Pylades, and the latter the Arethuse and the Hussar.

THE FASTNET sailed for Halifax yesterday afternoon at half-past five with a good general cargo, which included 1200 cases lobsters, 100 brls. pork, 600 bags oats, 175 bags potatoes and 145 cases eggs.
