WANTED MORE DRESSES.—The wife of Wesley Alexander, of Wilmington, Del., has closed. Mr. Alexander was in comfortable circumstances, but was unable to gratify the extravagant tastes of his wife for dress and society, and so she made up her mind to go off with somebody that could.

WIRE ISLAND HORSES.—The St. John Telegraph says: Yesterday the public safety department purchased two fine draught horses, each weighing about 1,400 lbs for No. 3 fire engine. The animals are black, well matched, and are 5 and 7 years old respectively. The price paid was \$380. The new team came from P. E. Island.

THE MISSING LINK.—A Digby correspondent of the Weymouth Free Press says that work on the Digby and Annapolis railway (the missing link) is progressing rapidly, and the road will probably be open for traffic about June 1st. The rails have been laid as far as the Little Joggins, and the bridges, with one or two exceptions are completed.

INDIAN AFFAIRS.—The report of the Minister of Indian Affairs for 1890 states that the Indian population has decreased by the ravages of a gripe. The Indians in British Columbia and the Northwest Territories complain that their wives and daughters are carried away for purposes of prostitution, and legislation dealing with the subject may be necessary.

AFRAID OF THE PRECEDENT.—A public meeting was held in Amherst last Wednesday evening, to express sympathy with the Messrs Robb, who have suffered so severely by fire, by exempting them from taxation for a term of years. A majority of those present, although extending heartfelt sympathy, were opposed to thus relieving the firm, who have not asked for any concession, as likely to establish a bad precedent.

OPENING OF THE HOUSE.—The guard of honor at the opening of the Provincial Legislature on Thursday, the 23rd inst., will be composed of the following detail: Garrison Artillery—1 First Lieutenant, 1 Sergeant, 20 Gunners. Engineers—1 Second Lieutenant, 1 Sergeant, 20 Sappers. 82nd Battalion—1 Captain, 1 Sergeant-Major, 69 men. A salute of 15 guns will be fired from Fort Edward by a detachment from No. 1 Battery, G. A., under command of Captain Davison.

ANOTHER EXPLOSION.—Bradley's nitro-glycerine works, near Petrolia, Ont., blew up about 8 o'clock on Wednesday evening. Three men were killed. How the explosion occurred is not known. The five acres on which the building was situated is literally covered with small pieces of bones and flesh, and the remains of the three killed could be put in a hushel basket. Where the building stood is marked by a hole about 15 feet deep and 50 feet across, caused by the force of the explosion of 30 quarts of glycerine.

POLICE COURT.—This morning the two tramps, Travis and Wilberton, were again arraigned, and evidence of their being professional beggars being at hand, they were each given three months imprisonment with hard labor. In passing sentence His Honor said that, if they were agreed, so soon as navigation was open he would give them passports from the place, and each assented to the proposal by a nod of the head. One drunk, a countryman, was fined \$2 and the charge against an East End man for violating the Lord's Day Act, was dismissed.

A LITTLE GIRL HERO.—Myrtle and Lottie Lumry, aged 6 and four years respectively, living at Platsville, Col., started a fire in the kitchen stove on Monday, using coal oil. The oil exploded, setting fire to both. They were so badly burned that death resulted. A baby, 10 months old, was rescued by Myrtle, who snatched it from the floor while she herself was burning and placed it between a feather bed and straw tick, smothering the flames and saving the infant's life.
