Lower Trend Continues In Unemployment Locally

The Charlottetown National Employment Office continues to report favourably on the unemployment situation. On Thursday evening last the office compiled figures showing a continuance of the downward trend in the number of unemployed. In mid-winter more than 4,200 people were on record as being unemployed in Kings and Queens Counties, both come under the administration of the Charlottetown Office. Prince County is administered from the local office in Summerside. The latest figures reveal less than 1,000 people unemployed in the two counties and some of these are fishermen who for administrative purposes continue to be shown as unemployed, and able to draw Unemployment Insurance Benefits in case they have a stormy week, and are unable to fish. In such event, they can draw unemployment insurance for the lost week. Even so the number of back to work people in the two counties has far more reached a peak but more and more jobs are getting underway, or progressing. OTHER JOBS IN PROSPECT Some Government jobs under the jurisdiction of the Dominion Department of Public Works have just commenced, and are not yet employing as many men as will be needed later. Similarly, the Provincial Government, although a very early start was made on road work, and the Provincial Department of Highways has been very energetic, more men will be employed as summer approaches. Very encouraging too is the amount of residential building, which is developing. New houses are springing up all over the Charlottetown area, and in many of the smaller towns and villages throughout the Island.

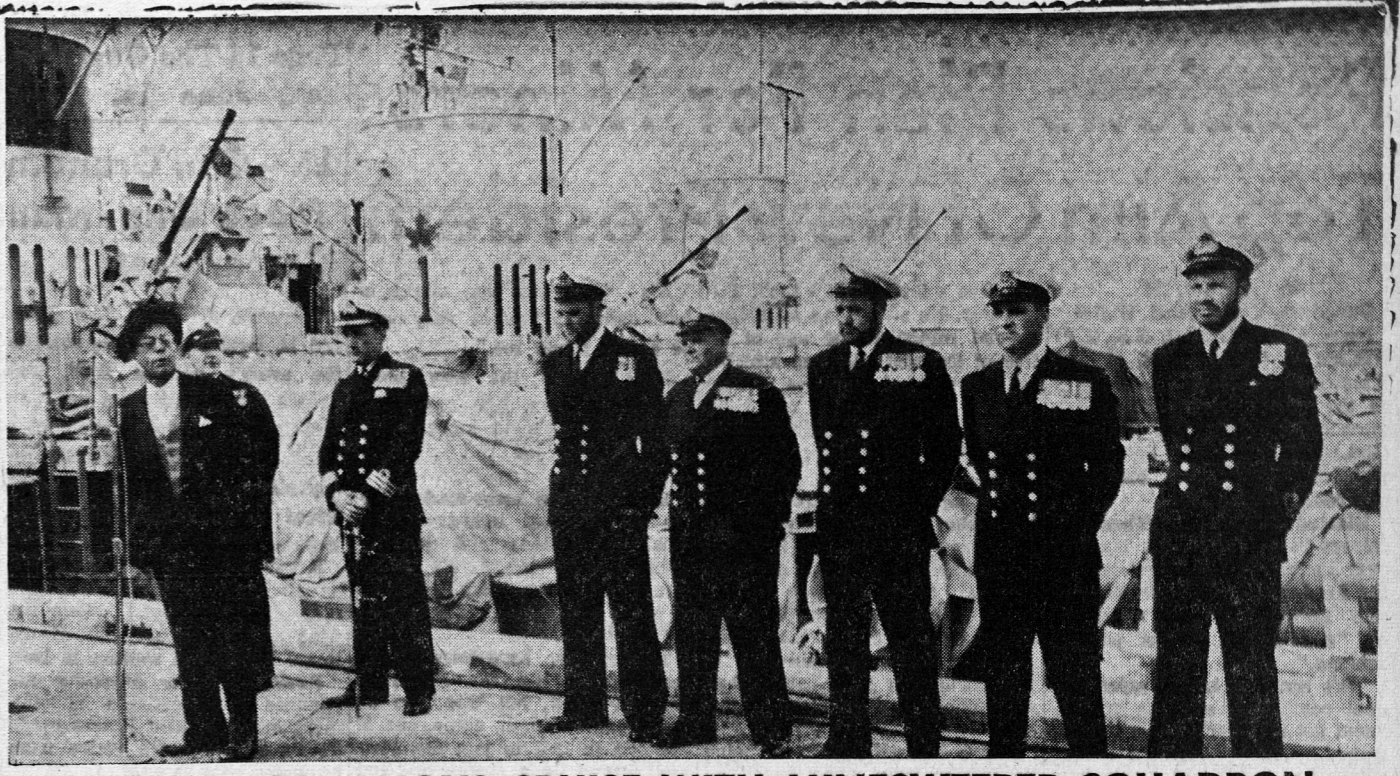
Stolen S'ide Truck Recovered
