RIEL'S EXECUTION!

The Excitement in Quebec

THE GOVERNMENT'S FIRM STAND.

MONTREAL, Nov. 18.

The feeling on the Riel question among the French Canadians, as manifested by the newspapers and public meetings is undoubtedly very bitter. The French papers all attack the Government for the execution, and party lines seem obliterated. An agitation is on foot to bring Riel's body here for burial. Riel's widow gives consent to this arrangement.

Riel's execution has set on foot a decided agitation in Quebec for annexation to the United States. However, the opinion is that affairs will soon quiet down. The Grits are making the most of the Government's embarrassment. It is said Sir John has received many telegrams and letters from former opponents, congratulating him on the firm stand taken by the Government.

The War in Bulgaria.

LONDON, Nov. 18.

Thirty thousand Servians were engaged in to-day's fighting at Sivenitza. A despatch from Belgrade says that Queen Natie has received a telegram from Baitchar, announcing the fall of Widdin. The same despatch says a portion of Merava division, after a severe fight, captured Roadmire. Four hundred prisoners arrived at Belgrade from the front.

LONDON, Nov. 18.

The Bulgarians, after desperate fighting, carried every one of the Servian positions which were menacing Sivenitza. Prince Alexander led the Bulgarian columns in person.

It is reported that the Turkish army corps has concentrated at Kumanoo, at the junction of Nissa and Sofia roads, and has thrown out outposts on the Servian and Bulgarian frontiers.

LONDON, Nov. 18.

An official despatch relative to the engagements between Servians and Bulgarians says: After heavy fighting Prince Alexander was forced to retreat. Both sides lost heavily.

LONDON, Nov. 19.

The Daily News has a despatch from Sofia confirming the report of the Bulgarians victory. The Servians lost 10 guns and 356 horse, and 3,000 men killed or wounded.

The Daily Telegraph says it is almost certain that Greece will go to war. The Prefect of Tru announces that the Servian inhabitants of that place, who took refuge in Sarvia, are at liberty to return.

It is reported that Prince Alexander has been wounded.

The Diritto of Rome says Austria is disposed to concede territory ratifications to Italy in return for Italy's changes in the political constitution of the Balkan's territory.

Alexander Sherriff, a delegate of the "Canadian Federation Association," is under arrest at Wolverhampton, England, for obtaining money by falsely stating he owned 10,000 acres on the Saskatchewan.

Boston Markets.

POTATOES, &c.—Potatoes have been moving off freely and sustain a firm tone. Sales of Houlton Rose at 58 to 60c, and Houlton Hebrons at 63 to 65c per bushel. Potatoes and Seedlings command 55 to 58c.

Eggs—Eastern extras are well sold up and firm at 28 to 29c per dozen, but other kinds are more plentiful and not selling as freely as last week. For held stock 24c is an outside price. Only the best marks of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island command over 26c.

FISH.—Receipts of mackerel for the week have been 1,871 barrels, including 1,590 barrels from outports and the fleet, and 281 barrels from foreign ports. The landings by the fleet are not given this week. No mackerel have been caught or seen for several days, and the vessels haul up as they arrive. Only one sail remains out from Boston, and 12 from Gloucester. At other ports, nearly all are in. The season, on the whole, has been very unprofitable to fishermen, owing to the low prices obtained, and many of the men are clear expenses. 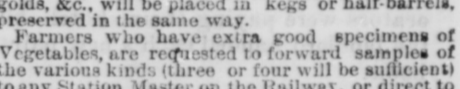
