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TORONTO

TORONTO (CP) — The stock market closed higher Wednesday during the heaviest trading in two weeks.
 Western oils, which earlier in the day hit a new four-year low on index, ended its slump during final trading and jumped more than one-half point.
 Mines, with the exception of a few lower-priced issues such as New Mylanaque and Can Erin, were relatively quiet. Senior uranium was mixed to higher, although gains were small. Algoma was up 1/2 at 10 1/2 and Gunar was up 10 cents to \$9.60.
 Western oils began active trading late in the day, though most of them were lower-priced issues with small changes and gains and losses about even.
 Earlier in the day they struck their lowest point since 1955 when they fell to \$8.31 on index. The previous low was set Tuesday at \$8.49.

MONTREAL (CP) — Papers, industrials and banks climbed slowly to slight index increases during light trading Wednesday on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges.
 Papers, with several new highs Tuesday, fell off on some stocks but managed to come up on the top of the strength of a 1 1/2-point gain in Price Brothers at 45 1/2 and fractional gains by Abitibi and Consolidated.
 Steels had a series of straight losses extending to 1/2 in Steel of Canada at 84 1/4.
 Base metals were stronger led by Aluminum, up 1% at 29 1/4. Nickel was up 1/2 at 99 1/2 while Hudson Bay dropped 1/4 at 48 1/2.
 Closing averages showed banks up .3 at 39.74, utilities off 1 at 142.1, industrials up 1.4 at 308.8, combined up .9 at 252.7, papers up .1 at 446.4 and golds off .24 at 81.52.
 Of 238 issues traded, 97 advanced, 73 declined and 62 were unchanged. There were nine new yearly lows and one new yearly high.

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Nfld. Woodworkers Chief Says Time Devoted To Union

GRAND FALLS, Nfld. (CP) — The president of the Newfoundland Brotherhood of Woodworkers (Ind) said Tuesday night his union is "devoted to loggers and we don't have the time" to answer criticism "designed to influence public opinion."
 Stirling Thoma was commenting on remarks made earlier by George Stoodley, president of the central Newfoundland local of the International Wood workers of America (I.C.L.C.). Mr. Stoodley charged that Newfoundland loggers are paying more for board and getting less for their work since the NBWW emerged to replace two decertified IWA locals at the height of last winter's loggers strike.
 Mr. Thoma said loggers are making a basic wage of \$11.50 a day, "more money than they ever made before."
 "There's not much I want to say about Mr. Stoodley's remarks... because he's only trying to influence public opinion."

Gunman Resents Toll Machines

HALIFAX (CP) — An official of the national harbors board in Montreal was threatened by a gunman prior to the installation of toll machines on the Jacques Cartier bridge, a board spokesman said here Tuesday.
 The spokesman said the board preferred not to name the man to protect his family.
 "We would confirm the fact that an official of the board in Montreal was threatened prior to installation of the automatic devices," the official said. "We don't want to identify him because of his family. That is all I can tell you."
 In answer to a question, the spokesman said the threat was made by a gunman.
