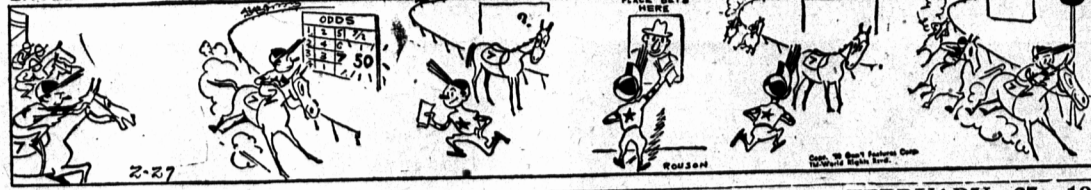

The hustling Glace Bay Miners are leaving no stones unturned in their attempts to overtake the second place Islanders. The Miners yesterday made it known that they would attempt to protest the games in which Ted Powers played with the Islanders after February 14. Powers, they stated, was recalled by Syracuse on February 14 but played several games with the Islanders after that date. It will be recalled that Powers did play three games with the local club between the 14th and the time he left here for Hartford, Conn.

Islanders Club President Frank MacDonald dismissed the Miners' statements last night. "There is a league ruling which states that a protest must be made in writing within twenty-four hours after the game has been played and it must be accompanied by a cheque for \$100," stated the Islanders president. "Actually the Miners have little to gain even if they had made a proper protest. In the three games that Powers played with the Islanders after the date of his recall the Islanders lost two and won one from Sydney Millionaires."

The player lists released for the February 15 deadline by Syracuse last week did not include Powers. As the Islanders reasoned before Powers left here Eddie Shore never intended to use him with Syracuse. Rather, Shore, who has special interest in the Springfield Indians and the Troy club, was seeking Powers for one or the other of these teams. The guessing here is that Powers is playing with Springfield as that centre is only a short drive from Hartford.

All Clubs in the Maritime Major Hockey League will be in the playoffs. President MacDonald stated last night that a motion to this effect had been passed at an M.M.H.L. meeting in New Glasgow on November 23 and that the motion had been made by Dr. F. C. Douglas. The semi-finals of the playoffs will likely see the first and fourth place teams matched against one another in one series while the second and third place squads play in the other. When he was here last week coach "Hub" Macey said it made no difference to the Miners if they played Halifax or Charlottetown in the first round. "We got to play both of them anyway," stated Macey.

The Saint Dunstan's University basketball team will leave this morning on a two-day road trip for games against St. Thomas College and the University of New Brunswick. Although these will be regular games of the N. B. P. E. I. Interscholastic League they mean little more to the Saints than regular exhibition contests. The Saints have already clinched first place in the two-province League but they will welcome the competition to prepare for the Maritime finals with St. F. X. early in March. The Saints play the Tommies tonight and tomorrow night they play in Fredericton.

Tonight in Calgary Harry Poulton of Charlottetown will step into the ring against highly rated Dick Wolfe of Klamath Falls, Oregon. Harry has been the white-haired boy to Calgary boxing fans since he fought to a draw with Lou Lawrence in a main event several weeks ago. The man he is fighting tonight holds two decisions over Irish Jimmy Nolan of Calgary. Wolfe has had 36 professional fights. He has won 18, tied eleven and lost eight.

Defenceman Lloyd MacCallum of Sandy's Ramblers, who is one of the keenest hockey followers in the Province, was the victim of tough luck last night when he broke his leg in a play-off game at North River Rink. The accident was an unavoidable one. MacCallum and the other player in the collision attempted to avoid one another but their limbs crossed and Lloyd broke his leg above the ankle. He was taken to hospital where he will remain for several days before returning to his home in Marshfield. MacCallum is a veteran of numerous hockey battles and also one of the Islanders' keenest supporters.

Glace Bay Miners Meet Islanders At Local Forum Tonight

The ambitious Glace Bay Miners who have their sights set on second place in the Maritime Major Hockey League, play the Islanders at the Forum tonight.

The Miners go into tonight's game with a nine game winning streak behind them and they need only one more win to tie the Islanders winning streak set in 1951 and equalled again this season.

But most important to both teams are the points to be gained in both tonight's and tomorrow night's games. Tomorrow night the two teams meet again at Glace Bay and a sweep of the back-to-back series by one team would have quite a bearing in the battle for second place.

Islanders Will Bring In Replacement For Powers

The Charlottetown Islanders will definitely bring in a replacement for centreman Ted Powers, it was stated here last night by Frank MacDonald, President of the Islanders Hockey Club.

When that replacement would arrive here was not ascertained. However the Islanders have considerable time in which to bring in a player.

Powers was recalled by Syracuse Warriors of the A. H. L. last week. His name has not been placed on the Syracuse playing lists and it is thought likely that Eddy Shore has sent him to either Springfield or Troy. Shore owns both clubs.

Ed Lopat Signs With Yankees

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., (AP)—Ed Lopat, 35-year-old New York Yankee southpaw, signed his 1953 contract Thursday and immediately participated in a light workout.

Lopat, bothered by a sore shoulder much of last season, signed a provisional contract, the first offered by the Yankees in four years.

According to the terms, Lopat will receive a base pay of \$21,000, a cut of \$7,000 or the maximum 25 per cent permitted by baseball law. The pact also provides that in the event he is able to work with normal proficiency, he will receive the \$7,000 and, with a fine season, can make even more.
