RAILWAY-MAN INJURED.—Mr. Pius S. Murphy, yardmaster, had a narrow escape from being seriously injured in the railway yard here on Saturday. A NEW CAR AXEL LUBRICATOR.—Mr. Shaughnessy, Assistant Manager of the C. P. Railway, has given an order to Master Car Builder Anderson to put the newly patented lubricated Vessot car axel lubricator to a test. This lubricator is said to be a most ingenious device, by reason of which an axel may be supplied with oil once and run for thousands of miles before requiring to be greased again, and all without heating in the slightest degree.—Moncton Times.

CATTLE SHIPMENTS.—The Summerside Agriculturist says: Messrs. Avard and Drummond shipped twenty head of cattle to St. John last Thursday. Many of them were very fine animals, the lot being much above the average. They have now in their stables here, for shipment, a very large and handsome bull, which they purchased a few days ago from Mr. James Richards, Bideford. Mr. David Keeffe, of St. John, shipped a very fine lot of fat cattle, thirty-four in number, by the St. Lawrence last Saturday morning.

Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, May 11. The grand total amount given for railway subsidies so far this season is \$3,486,000. Of this amount Ontario received \$1,433,000, divided amongst fourteen railways; Quebec, \$1,272,000 to sixteen roads; New Brunswick, \$367,600 to seven roads; Nova Scotia, \$290,000 to two roads; British Columbia, \$112,000 to one road, and P. E. Island \$96,000 to one road. It is understood that there will be another batch of subsidies granted this year, which will be presented this week.

A. F. Gault, the cotton king of Montreal, is about to leave for England to organize a syndicate to buy up all the cotton mills in Canada, with the object of preventing cut-throat competition and to regulate prices.

There is a strong feeling among the Conservatives of Lincoln that Rykert ought to be opposed. The Liberals will put a candidate in the field, probably an Equal Righter.

It has been definitely decided to unite the restaurants of the Commons and Senate next year, and run it as a club.

It is understood that a special effort will be made by the Department of Agriculture this year, with the increased vote to attract immigrants from Iceland. Latest advice says the population of the whole island would like to emigrate to Canada if means were available to transport their goods and chattels.

Mr. Provost of Trinity University cables from London that neither Oxford, Cambridge nor London University has signed the memorial regarding Trinity's musical degrees. Mr. Provost says everything is favorable for Trinity.

Embezzlement.

ALBANY, N. Y., May 11.

George P. Whitney, bookkeeper of the Albany City National Bank, was arrested Saturday afternoon, charged with embezzlement of the bank's funds. The defalcations have been going on at least two years. He was first suspected on Monday. Whitney has made a confession which may result in implicating a prominent business firm here. It is understood the defalcation is the result of a conspiracy between Whitney and the firm referred to. Speculation is thought to be one cause of the crime. Whitney has been admitted to bail for \$20,000. The officers of the bank say its solvency is not involved.

News from the Sea.

HALIFAX, May 12.

The American schooner Julia E. Whelan arrived this morning from the Banks for wood and water. She has 50,000 pounds of cod and 2,000 pounds of halibut on board. Capt. Bowman reports fish very scarce on the banks.

The Norwegian bark Maitland, at North Sydney from Halifax, picked up four men in dories between Sable Island and Casco. They belonged to the schooner Mary E. Leslie, and had been in the dories four days without food or water. They suffered terribly.

Another Cyclone.

PITTSBURG, Pa., 11

A special from Franklin, Pa., says: A terrible cyclone passed over the Southern part of this country last evening. Two people were killed and a large number dangerously injured. The storm was generally throughout the country. The cyclone was about 300 feet wide and in extent 25 miles. Everything in its path was demolished.

The Fatal Tornado.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 11.

Several tornadoes occurred in different parts of North Missouri within the past two days. A large amount of property was destroyed and several people were killed.
