Member Of Campbell Clan Observes 96th Birthday

Miss Flora Ann Campbell, the oldest member in the Sacred Heart Home, celebrates her 96th birthday on Monday, November 24th. Miss Campbell is a descendant of a Scotch pioneer who came with the Glenaladale settlers, most of whom were from Uist Island, on that ship Alexander in 1772 and settled at Scotchfort on the Hillsborough River.

Later the Campbells moved to Johnston's River. A Neil of this family married Sarah MacInnis who bore him thirteen children.

Neil settled at Cape Traverse in 1812, and here Flora Ann's father, Stephen Campbell, was born in 1824. On the 18th of February, 1860, Stephen married Catherine MacDonald of Indian River, and Flora Ann was born to them on the 24th of November, 1862.

It is interesting to record that Flora Ann's uncle, Neil Campbell and his adventurous friend Donald MacInnis pioneered the first winter crossing between Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine in 1827, thus estab-

ing the famous era of the ice boats. Men of the Campbell clan were usually to be found in the crews of the ice-boats, and Miss Campbell can relate many tales of the men who risked their lives to maintain winter communications with the mainland.

Aunt Flora Ann, despite her long life, is a remarkably bright and jolly lady, and those who call at her cheerful room find that they are the ones that are uplifted by the visit. They will find her busy reading, writing, or crocheting without benefit of glasses, or tending the plants in her window.

Last Christmas she had the honour of speaking over the C.B.C. network during the Christmas Day Broadcast. She has been at

the home for eighteen years. She has just finished a fine piece of crochet work which will be on her Christmas list.

Mr. Lorne C. Callbeck is a relative of Miss Campbell. Her father and Mr. Callbeck's great-grandfather were brothers. Mr. Callbeck drops in quite frequently to see Miss Campbell and says: "Talking with her is a strange experience. It is almost as if going into the past and talking with an ancestor."

Her Island province is very proud of Miss Campbell. Her clan and numerous friends have wished her many more happy and quite active years.

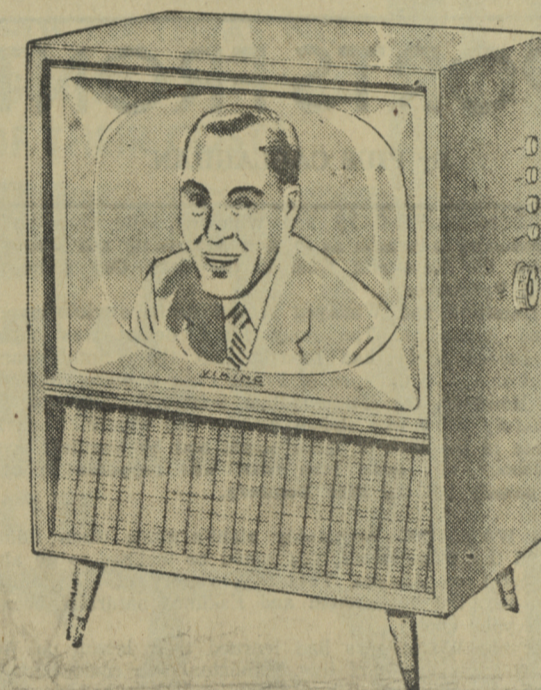

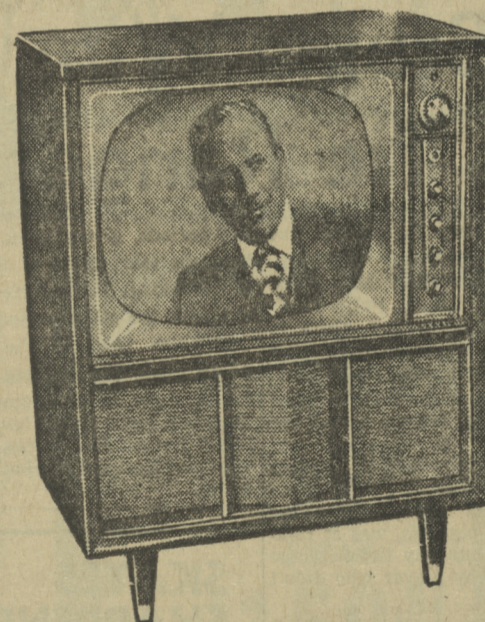

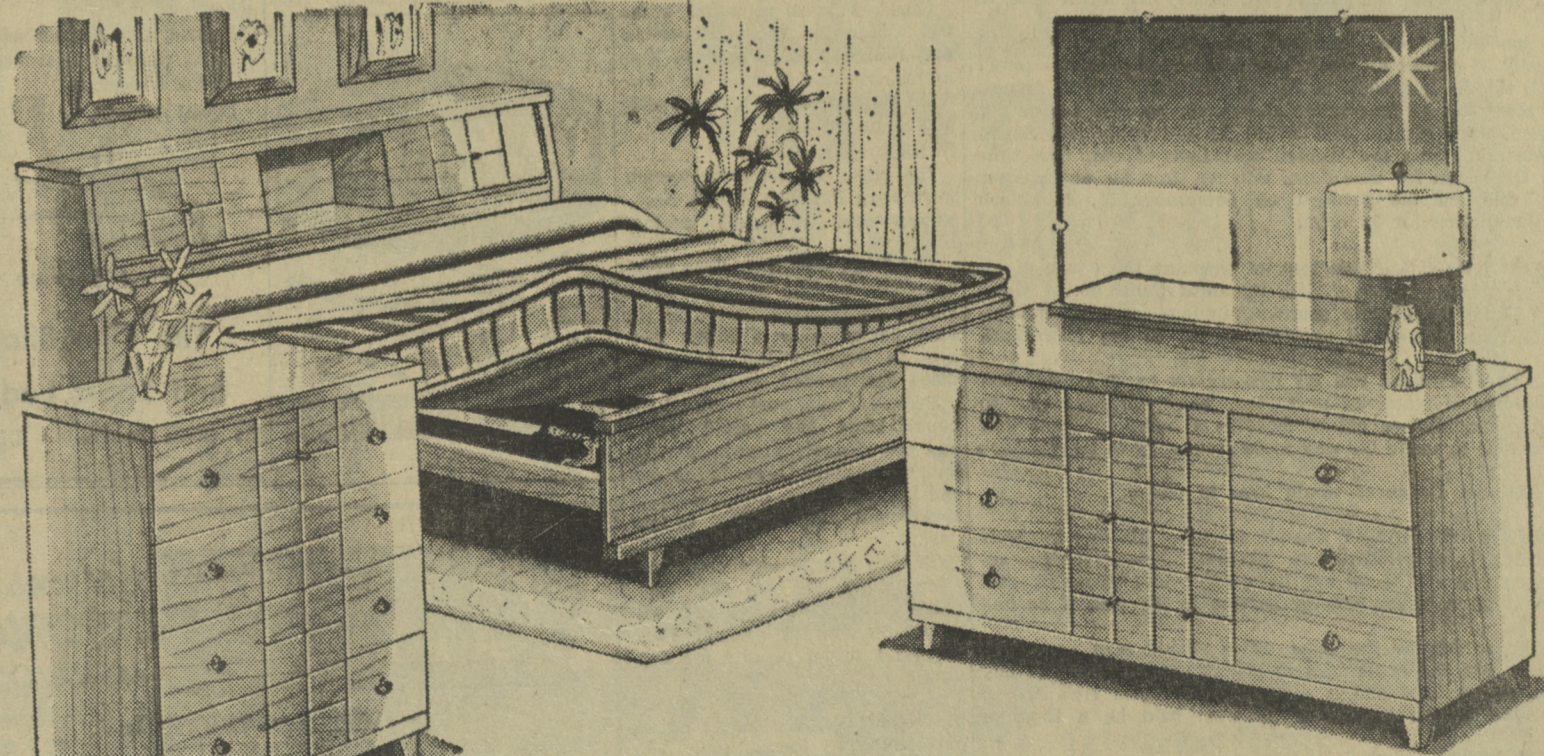
