### LET'S EAT

#### Adding Herbs To Foods Makes Gaurment Dishes

"The right use of herbs is the seasoning secret of many de luxe dishes and also the secret of giving many inexpensive dishes a glamorous taste," observed the Chef. "With your permission, Madame, I would like to suggest ways to use them."

Herbs may be used fresh, dried or powdered. One tablespoon of any minced fresh herb equals 1 teaspoon of a dried herb, or 1/4 teaspoon powdered herb.

**DRIED HERBS**

"Always reconstitute a dried herb by steeping it 5 minutes in barely enough liquid to cover. Use water or stock for soups and most sauces; milk for a cream sauce; lemon or fresh lime juice for salads. Add the liquid with the herb."

"Fines Herbes are a mixture of light-flavored herbs such as parsley, chervil, chives and tarragon. They are always added at the end of the cooking."

"Strong herbs include sage, basil, mint, dill, rosemary, thyme and marjoram and are always added during the cooking."

Tomorrow's Dinner: Chilled tomato juice; cold omelette; dark bread; salad bowl of old-time cooked vegetables; stewed pomegranate sponge cupcakes; hot or iced coffee or tea or milk.

All measurements are level recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

Salad Bowl of Old-Time Cooked Vegetables: Combine 2 c. small-diced cooked potatoes, 1 c. diced cooked carrots and 1 c. each cooked green peas and green beans.

Add 1 tsp. grated onion and 1/4 c. old-time cooked salad dressing or enough to moisten. Refrigerate at least 1 hr.

Add 1 c. fine-diced celery or a mixture of chopped cabbage, sliced red radishes and small-diced firm portion cucumber.

Blend with old-time cooked dressing. Serve on lettuce.

Old-Time Salad Dressing: Delicious with cooked vegetables or for blending fish, meat or poultry.

In a double boiler top, melt 1/4 c. butter. Stir in 3 tsp. sugar, 1/4 c. flour, 1/4 tsp. dry mustard, 1/2

## Canada's Shakespeare Triumphs At Edinburgh

EDINBURGH (CP)—The world-famed Edinburgh Festival today hailed Canada's Shakespeare company from Stratford, Ont.

The players from the Ontario Shakespearean Festival, first Commonwealth drama group from outside Britain to perform here in 10 years of the Scottish extravaganza, drew cheers and bravos Tuesday night with their performance of Henry V, and waited the verdict of the critics with confidence.

It was a personal triumph in the title role for Christopher Plummer, the Montreal actor who began carving out a career on Broadway before going back to Canada for the Stratford season. The Canadian group got a special accolade from Robert Ponsbury, the Edinburgh festival artistic director.

It was marvelous," he said, "our invitation to Stratford to come to Edinburgh has been justified 1,000 times."

SELL-OUT AUDIENCE

The Stratford company put on their performance in Edinburgh's Church of Scotland assembly hall before a sell-out audience including the Princess Royal, representing the Royal Family. The whole company was called back for three curtain calls.

Also hailed in the cast was Montreal's Gilette Letondal, in the role of Catherine. She said her heart "pounded all the time."

When the play was presented at Stratford, critics from Canada and the United States had high praise for the French-Canadian accents of the Quebec players who portray the French parts. This factor was one of the ones most anxiously awaited for British critic reaction.

Afterwards, the Princess Royal went backstage and greeted several of the company in their dressing rooms.

As it did in Stratford, the company will also present the Greek drama "Oedipus Rex" at the festival, alternating the two productions before the Edinburgh Festival ends Sept. 8.

## They Love To See Her On Friday

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—Silver-haired Bertha Becker is popular with her office colleagues — especially every second Friday.

For 41 years she has made up the pay-roll for an electrical company here. When she first started, there were less than 100 employees.

Now she handles pay envelopes for 800 factory employees and 300 office staff. "They love to see me every second Friday," she says with a smile.

## NONE HURT IN CRASH

STRATFORD, Ont. (CP) — A Windsor - Toronto passenger train moving at 10 miles an hour, smashed into a stationary express-refrigerator car here early Thursday. The nine-car passenger train derailed the refrigerator car at a level crossing, ripping out several ties and gouging a deep hole in the ground. About 60 passengers and train crew escaped injury. The entire front of the steam locomotive and the end of the refrigerator car were damaged. Trains were delayed two hours while the line was cleared and the crossing damage repaired.

## FUMES KILL FOUR

TOKYO (AP) — Four persons were killed Monday by gas poisoning in an abandoned coal pit in Hanakawa, 90 miles northeast of here. Police said a farmer and his friend broke into the pit, which lapsed 30 feet from the entrance. The others, waiting outside, became alarmed by the delay and crawled in. They too, were soon overcome.

## Wed By Proxy After Being Engaged By Correspondence

OTTAWA (CP)—An engagement through correspondence and marriage by proxy has been climaxed by a church ceremony here and the happy couple at last are together.

The unusual courtship of Mr. and Mrs. Wauter Hein Koolman was settled permanently with a wedding ceremony at St. John's Anglican Church here this month.

The two had been married by proxy last April. Mr. Koolman, who grew up in Java in the South Pacific, was in Canada at the time. The former Christina Feenstra of Bilthoven, Holland, was in her Netherlands home. A friend stood in for the groom.

They decided on the proxy marriage as the only solution to their immigration problem. While single Mrs. Koolman was unable to enter Canada without having a Canadian citizen to sponsor her and a job waiting for her. Her husband had not been in Canada long enough to qualify for citizenship.

But as the wife of a resident of Canada, Mrs. Koolman had no difficulty entering the country. Mr. Koolman, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. Johan Gerard Koolman, live in Bolomombo, Belgian Congo, in Africa, came to Canada in 1933 from Holland. He will have put in the five years necessary to qualify for Canadian citizenship by 1938.

He had gone to Holland in 1935 to complete high school education interrupted by the Second World War. He also attended university to study horticulture.

He and his parents were living in Java when the war started and were interned for the duration in a Japanese prison camp.

It was during his seven years in Holland that he met his wife. They carried on their courtship by mail after Mr. Koolman came to Canada.
