Jaycee Road-e-o Has Record Entry

A record entry list of 62 contestants will be on hand for the opening of the Junior Chamber of Commerce sponsored P.E.I. Teen-age Safe Driving Championships at Prince of Wales College at 9 o'clock this morning.

Tom Davies, general chairman of the Jaycee committee said that his organization was surprised at the response of the teenagers to the driving competition, but commented that it was also very pleased.

Last year 39 teenagers took part on a local basis, and more than 20,000 youths took advantage of the club-sponsored Road-e-o on a national scale, competing in some 235 communities.

A parade this morning consisting of approximately 50 new model cars and floats showing the results of careful driving will leave the west side of Government Pond at approximately 10:30 and make its way via Prince of Wales College, Queen, Kent, Great George, and Easton streets to Brighton road and finally Queen Charlotte High School.

The driving portion of the contest will start at 9 a.m. at Prince of Wales College, with the driving tests beginning at that day, at 8 p.m. Father Sattler will speak at a public meeting of the Community Center at 8 p.m.

The driving test is made up of the mastering of four different skills. These include the straight line test, the serpentine test, the accurate stop test, and the parallel parking test.

The provincial winner, besides winning some valuable prizes will receive an expense-paid trip to Saint John, N.B. in June to participate in the District Atlantic Championship.

The Saint John winner and runner-up will journey to Quebec for a four day period to compete for the national championship and scholarships totaling \$2,500.
